Request for information under the Freedom of Information Act 1989

I refer to your request received on 3 June 2011 and subsequent refined scope requests received on 14 July 2011 and 14 September 2011, seeking access to documents under the ACT Freedom of Information Act 1989 held by the Treasury Directorate.

In agreeing to a refined scope you seek copies of:

"...correspondence between ACT Treasury Ministers (including Ministerial Offices) during the caretaker period for the 2008 ACT elections".

Limited to:

"...correspondence between the above mentioned parties in relation to the costing of Government and political party election/promises, any proposal to cost promises or undertakings by the government or political parties, and any associated documents.

I am the officer authorised under Section 22 of the Act to make a decision in relation to your request. I have agreed to the release of the attached documents.

The attached documents include correspondence the Treasury Directorate provided to, or received from, the Minister's office between 12 September 2008 and 18 October 2008.

Where documents have previously been supplied to your office or are already publically available, such as final media statements or policies, these are listed in the schedule and have not been provided for administrative efficiency.

You will also note that I have decided not to release some of the documents under Section 36 internal working documents.

Section 36 states: Internal working documents

- (1) Subject to this section, a document is an exempt document if its disclosure under this Act—
 - (a) would disclose matter in the nature of, or relating to, opinion, advice or recommendation obtained, prepared or recorded, or consultation or deliberation that has taken place, in the course of, or for the purposes of, the deliberative processes involved in the functions of an agency or Minister or of the Territory;

Exemptions under Section 36 relate to draft documents that could mislead or confuse if made publically available. These documents include:

- draft costing advice on a range of possible policy announcements of a political party, which did not reflect the final party position or the costing undertaken by Treasury (68-76, 119, 300, 301);
- draft advice on budget savings proposed by a political party not reflecting the final Treasury presentation (303, 304); and
- a document presenting the impact of the election commitments of the two parties on the Territory's operating result that was not consistent with the final Treasury presentation (337).

In addition, a number of internal working documents were created specifically for this FOI request and have been exempted under Section 36 (399-405, 408, 409, 412-421). These documents relate to internal Treasury decision making processes and many contain information outside of the scope of the request. It is not expected that their release would add value in the public arena and are more likely to confuse.

You will also note that there are a number of documents that have been exempted under Section 42 (424-443). These documents relate to legal advice and would be privileged from production in legal proceedings on the ground of legal professional privilege.

Section 42 states: Documents subject to legal professional privilege

(1) A document is an exempt document if it is of such a nature that it would be privileged from production in legal proceedings on the ground of legal professional privilege.

Finally, you will note that I have released a number of documents which include draft party policies and media releases as well as versions of the running tally of the cost as they were announced during the course of the caretaker period. I trust that you will treat these documents are draft and rely on the released versions of the party election commitments, and the 17 October 2008 Treasury costing (available on the Treasury website).

Fees and Charges:

Processing charges have not been applied in this instance.

Rights of Review

My decision to exempt some documents is reviewable under Section 59 of the Act. If you wish to seek an internal review you should write to:

You have 28 days from the date of the notification of the documentation to seek a review, or such other period as the Chief Executive of this Department permits.

release matches the running sheet. As mentioned most costs are presented over three years, other documents we have seen are over four. Might want to confirm if this was intentional.

I also note that the release does not include a cost for indigenous teachers, but there is a cost in our running sheet. It may be useful to clarify if this is changing the composition of teachers to employ a higher proportion of indigenous teachers ie no cost, or putting in additional indigenous teachers, above current staffing levels which would have a cost. If it is the former we can delete this from the running sheet.

ACT Labor to assist Indigenous grandparents, teachers and trainees to support the next generation of Indigenous leaders.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government would provide targeted assistance to Indigenous grandparents, teachers, trainees and rising leaders to support the next generation of the ACT's Indigenous leaders.

Chief Minister Jon Stanhope made the announcement today outside the cultural centre at....

Mr Stanhope said a re-elected ACT Labor Government would continue to consult with and listen to the Indigenous community to improve services and policies that affect the lives of Indigenous Canberrans.

"A re-elected ACT Labor Government would better support grandparents – in particular grandmothers - who are the primary carers for their grandchildren by investing \$120,000 in a new program to be designed with the local Indigenous community," Mr Stanhope said. "Elements of the program could include social events, playgroups, assistance with transport, homework clubs and sporting activities.

"A re-elected ACT Labor Government would commit up to \$90,000 to enhance the Indigenous public service traineeships pilot program for young Indigenous Canberrans, with a guarantee of a job for those who complete the program.

"We would explore, in consultation with the Indigenous elected body, options for increasing the number of Indigenous teachers and teacher's aides in our public schools - one of the most powerful positive influences on Indigenous students.

"A re-elected ACT Labor Government would invest \$240,000 in an Indigenous Leadership grants program and \$200,000 over four years for an independent facilitator to provide ongoing professional advice to the elected Indigenous body."

Mr Stanhope said other commitments included developing Indigenous cultural tourism opportunities and \$150,000 for the research and compilation of genealogies of each of the acknowledged traditional Ngunnawal clans based in the ACT.

"The ACT Labor Government wants to help Aboriginals, who are indigenous to this region, to know and tell their own histories," Mr Stanhope said.

Mr Stanhope said the ACT Labor Government had worked hard in partnership with the Indigenous community to provide improved opportunities and to promote social inclusion.

"The ACT Labor Government has established the nation's first Aboriginal Justice Centre and constituted an elected Indigenous representative body with the first elections held in June 2008," Mr Stanhope said. "We have supported Indigenous students by funding literacy and numeracy support for 'at risk' children and provided greater support for high-performing students.

"The ACT Labor Government has also pledged \$10.8 million for an Indigenous-specific drug and alcohol rehabilitation service, now in the final design phase.

"A re-elected ACT Labor Government would build on these achievements with more targeted assistance for Indigenous grandparents, teachers, trainees and rising leaders to support the next generation of ACT's Indigenous leaders.

LABOR COMMITS TO MORE BUSES, GOING YOUR WAY

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will invest an additional \$10 million to improve the ACTION bus service in Canberra, Minister for Territory and Municipal Services John Hargreaves announced today.

"ACT Labor is committed to providing an effective, efficient and reliable public transport system for the Canberra community," said Mr Hargreaves.

The new measures will increase frequency of services, provide more bus-stop seats and shelters as well as create dedicated bus routes around the City for workers and tourists.

"Since the introduction of *Network 08* in June this year, there has been a sharp increase in demand for public transport, "Mr Hargreaves said.

"And ACT Labor is responding by providing funding to make the ACTION bus service even better for commuters," he said.

Query 1: How much was saved in operating costs by transfering functions to TAMS?

Advice: In 2008-09 the saving is \$4.7 million in tourism costs. Of this \$0.7 million was for administration and \$4 million was in the rationalisation of staff and programs.

Query 2: Claim that the ACT Government spent \$22 million on tourism and promotion in 2003-04 and received \$107 million in indirect taxation revenue.

Advice: The only ACT Government revenue line that is likely to be directly affected by tourist expenditure is payroll tax. Total payroll tax revenue in 2003-04 was \$177 million and an upper bound of tourism's contribution is around 4 to 5 per cent or \$8 million — reflecting tourism's share of the ACT economy. However, in reality tourism's contribution to payroll tax revenue is likely to have been much less than \$8 million because a significant proportion of tourist expenditure relates to small businesses (eg cafes and restaurants) that are below the payroll tax threshold of \$1.25 million payroll (the threshold is now \$1.5 million).

For every dollar spent by a tourist in the ACT there is a flow on effect. For example, if a tourist purchases a meal in a Canberra restaurant, in addition to the meal supplied by the restaurant, any local businesses that supply the restaurant are also likely to increase their output.

While tourism is undoubtedly and important part of the ACT economy, both the direct economic effect of tourism expenditure in the ACT and the so-called "economic multiplier effect" are often over stated.

A common mistake is to assume that an extra dollar spent in the ACT results in an extra dollar of "value added" by the ACT economy — that is to say, it is a common mistake to assume that it adds and an extra dollar to the ACT's Gross State Product (GSP).

This is a mistake because it does not take account of imports into the ACT. In the restaurant example, the ingredients of the restaurant meal are likely to be imported into the ACT. Another example is a tourist's expenditure on petrol in the ACT, with the value added by the ACT economy being only a fraction of the value of a tank of petrol.

While public funds devoted to tourism may have some multiplier effect, those public funds would also have effects, or benefits, if spent on other purposes (for example, health).

Meredith Hunter ACT Greens candidate for Ginninderra today launched the ACT Greens education policy for the 2008 Assembly election.

"Most ACT students do very well out of our school systems but there is a growing achievement gap for some" Meredith Hunter said today.

"The first priority for the Greens is to make sure education resources get to the schools and the students that need them most.

"That includes students with disabilities, some from low-income families, and others struggling to keep up or reach their potential.

"We are delighted that the ACT Government has finally acknowledged this growing achievement gap and committed resources to address it.

"Programs the Greens will initiate will include parent involvement programs to support literacy learning at home, and home/school liaison officers to encourage family participation in schools and student learning.

"ACT Greens will review and reassess all school and preschool closures using criteria that include community impact, climate change impact and parent attitudes. We also support amending the Education Act to ensure that inclusive and transparent consultation is undertaken before a school can be closed.

"In the area of early childhood, the ACT Greens Policy is to introduce free preschool from the age of 3 years. In the short term we would look to ensure that existing preschools can accommodate playschools for 3 year olds. We will also ensure that the governance of preschools in primary school settings is shared between preschool societies and the Education department.

"At the other end of the spectrum, the ACT Greens proposes a fresh look at secondary education. We would free up resources to enable school communities to provide targeted, relevant, engaging programs fro their students. An across the board reduction in class sizes at the high school level does not allow schools to do this.

"We commit to reinstating the teaching staff cut from high schools and colleges in the 2006 ACT Government horror budget.

"Finally, the ACT Greens will commission extensive research into the drift away from Government schools and then devise and implement plan to reverse that trend.

Cash-back pledge for energy-smart appliances, help for low-income households highlights of climate-change package

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will give cash incentives to Canberrans who buy green appliances and will help low income-earners retrofit their homes to cut their heating and cooling bills.

The strategies are the centrepiece of the new package of climate-change initiatives ACT Labor will fund, if re-elected on October 18.

"Labor will spend \$4 million over four years to encourage Canberrans to buy energy-efficient appliances or insulate their homes," Chief Minister Jon Stanhope announced today.

"Up to \$400 will be made available in the form of cash-back rebates for Canberrans who buy fridges and freezers with a 4-star rating or higher, air conditioners with a 5-star rating or higher, controllers that switch off equipment when it is not needed, and insulation for houses over five years of age.

"The program will incorporate a hand-back strategy, to ensure that old whitegoods are disposed of appropriately."

Mr Stanhope said Labor would commit another \$4 million over the next term to helping low-income households install window and door seals, window coverings, home insulation, insulation on exposed pipes and other energy-saving additions.

The program would target concession-card or seniors-card holders living in homes over five years old.

A further \$4 million over four years would support renters to buy appliances with a five-star rating or higher.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government would also encourage the phasing out of electric hot water systems with \$1.5 million to simplify and extend the existing solar hot water rebate scheme to provide up to a \$1000 rebate to households replacing electric systems with solar hot water systems.

To address salinity in Canberra's waste water flowing out of the Territory, Labor will earmark \$150,000 a year for a campaign to promote the purchase of low-salt washing products, and other measures to reduce salt levels.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will repeat its hugely popular free grey water hose program, which enables households to divert washing-machine water onto gardens. (VALUE??)

A new rebate will encourage Canberrans to buy water-efficient washing machines, with \$150 rebates paid for 5-star machines and \$200 rebates for 6-star machines.

A re-elected Labor Government will boost the water tank rebate program by \$600,000 and extend the rebate to new tanks with or without an internal plumbing connection. A higher rebate will be payable for tanks with an internal connection.

An annual pick-up of bulky waste from households and free drop-off facilities for electronic waste are among the initiatives a re-elected Labor Government will introduce.

Chief Minister John Stanhope today announced that \$2 million would be invested in a trial of a voucher system for an annual pick-up of bulky waste from households, to assist Canberrans without trailers or other means of ridding themselves of bulky items.

"Labor understands the difficulty some Canberrans have in disposing of old furniture or appliances – particularly Canberrans with physical limitations or on low incomes. That's why we have decided to trial a voucher system that would allow a once-yearly pick-up.

"The results of the trial will be assessed and inform future policy-making."

The Chief Minister also announced today that \$2.4 million would be invested to make it easier for households and businesses to recycle electronic waste at free drop-off facilities, replacing the existing pay-to-drop scheme.

In addition, waste ending up in landfill would be reduced by up to 20,000 tonnes a year through the allocation of \$1.5 million to a materials recycling facility at the Mugga and Mitchell transfer stations.

Good corporate citizenship would be encouraged through the exploration of an accreditation scheme to recognise best-practice waste management in the hospitality and supermarket industries. ACT Labor will consult with the hospitality and supermarket sectors to assess interest in an opt-in accreditation scheme that would allow businesses to badge themselves as a WasteWise business.

Labor will also work with the supermarket sector to develop a Composting Handbook to encourage recycling of organic and biodegradable wastes by retailers and will pursue proposals from business to develop new and innovative waste recovery industries in the ACT.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will trial solar street lighting and boost its use of accredited green power from 23% to 30% in the first year of a new term, ratcheting up the target in future years as energy from renewable sources becomes more widely available.

Chief Minister Jon Stanhope said Labor would also commit to putting solar panels on every public school, with \$2 million for the first three years of the program, and would boost the percentage of hybrid cars in the ACT Government car fleet from 3.5% to 5%.

The fleet has already been changed to four-cylinder vehicles, except in cases where there is operational need for an alternative.

"Climate change will have far-reaching impacts on every member of our community, and there are things we can each do to minimise that impact," Mr Stanhope said.

"A re-elected Labor Government will spend \$200,000 on advising and supporting businesses to plan for and adapt to climate change and will continue its progress towards carbon neutrality in government agencies.

"We will trial both solar and LED street lighting in Civic pedestrian areas and selected suburbs and assess the through-life costs, availability and performance of each technology, with a view to making it the standard.

"And in partnership with the Property Council and the Green Building Council we will examine how existing buildings might be refurbished to achieve a green-star rating."

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with business owners and police on a co-ordinated community safety program, integrating CCTV and other strategies to combat crime and anti-social behaviour in Canberra's entertainment areas.

Minister for Police and Emergency Services, Simon Corbell, made the \$1.5 million community safety announcement in Civic today.

Under the Community Safety CCTV Partnership Program business owners, police, city rangers, liqour and parking inspectors and security officers will work together as part of a co-ordinated strategy to improve safety in the entertainment areas, particularly in Manuka, Kingston and Civic.

This program will involve the co-ordination of law enforcement, liquor licensing and security activities and community consultation with local businesses.

ACT Labor will provide \$1.5m over four years to staff the program and fund an educational and awareness campaign to combat aggressive behaviour among late night patrons.

"This initiative is based on the principle that the underlying causes of crime need to be examined as a whole to effectively tackle crime," Mr Corbell said.

We will enhance our transport research and evaluation capabilities, improve our transport policy frameworks, take advantage of new vehicle technologies, and actively engage the Commonwealth in the identification of strategic major transport infrastructure projects.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will also plan for an integrated transport future by engaging more actively with the Commonwealth, other states and territories, and infrastructure providers to investigate and promote better connectivity between Canberra and the national transport network.

Enhancing taxi services

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work cooperatively with the taxi industry and the airport to introduce a new High Occupancy Taxi Service between the airport, Barton and Civic.

Canberra is a truly sustainable and creative city and national capital. We have a community that is socially inclusive and which acknowledges and supports those who are vulnerable and in need and enabling all to reach their full potential.

Canberra is also a centre of economic growth and innovation and is proudly the nation's capital city and home of its pre-eminent cultural institutions.

And Canberra is a place of great natural beauty with a proud history of balance between development and sustainability.

Our pristine natural environment is one of the things that make Canberra such a great place to live. Canberrans value the open spaces and outdoor facilities that are in our community.

ACT Labor has a great track record in adding to the amenity of Canberra's open spaces through the addition of 1500 extra hectares of nature parks, as well as maintaining and upgrading local neighbourhood parks and playgrounds.

- Two new dog exercise enclosures, one in Belconnen and the other in Tuggeranong. These enclosures will be fully fenced with gate access, water, signage, seating and short exercise courses for owners to train their dogs;

A Proud Record of Investment in Canberra's Transport System

ACT Labor has long recognised that transport issues are central in planning for the future development of Canberra.

We have incorporated transport into our guiding policy documents – the Territory Plan, the Spatial Plan, the Sustainable Transport Plan, the Accessible Public Transport Action Plan, the ACT Affordable Housing Strategy, and Weathering the Change – the ACT Climate Strategy 2007-2025.

ACT Labor has made significant investments in improving public transport and transport infrastructure in the ACT, including the development of an integrated transport framework that addresses sustainable transport, public transport, road safety, the taxi system, cycleways, pedestrian access, community transport needs, car parking and road infrastructure.

- More than \$3 million for road and bridge safety issues;
- More than \$40 million for parking initiatives; and

 Provision for 'Park and Ride' and 'Kiss and Ride' initiatives to support the public transport system as well as introducing a wide range of concessions including pensioner discounts, Gold Card for over 75's and free travel for bike riders.

Moving Forward

ACT LABOR'S 2008 HOUSING STRATEGY TOWARDS MORE HOUSING OPTIONS FOR CANBERRANS

Labor has a vision for Canberra for the next four years

Labor's vision is for a city where everyone is housed appropriately and affordably and where the needs of an ageing community are catered for and anticipated.

Labor's vision is to reduce the number of people experiencing homelessness and to provide pathways into long-term, secure housing for those in greatest need.

Labor's vision is for a robust social housing system that provides high quality accommodation and support options for its tenants.

Labor's vision is for a city where the aspiration of home ownership can be satisfied, but which caters too for renters, for those in community housing, for those in public housing, for Canberrans with disabilities, and for the ageing.

Our achievements

In its first term, Labor delivered targeted, means-tested stamp duty concessions for first-home buyers, expanded the land release program, replaced 81 public housing properties and invested more than \$13 million in homelessness initiatives.

In April 2007, in response to a decline in affordability in most capital cities, including Canberra, Labor launched a comprehensive Affordable Housing Action Plan, featuring more than 60 separate initiatives to tackle affordability at its roots. Initiatives implemented to date include:

- the release of a record 3,400 housing blocks in 2007-08 and a new rolling five-year land release program;
- streamlined land release and approval processes, and the introduction of englobo land releases;
- a requirement that 15% of new developments be devoted to house and land packages priced between \$200,000 and \$300,000;
- targeted stamp duty concessions for low-income earners and stamp duty exemptions for pensioners moving to more appropriate accommodation;
- a 20% increase in the stamp duty income ceiling households with incomes upto
 \$120,000 are now eligible for the Home Buyer Concession Scheme;
- Deferral of stamp duty for up to 5 years;
- land rent, to enable families on incomes as modest as \$50,000 to purchase their own home:
- an invitation to institutional investors to build affordable private rental accommodation;
- a boost to community housing, with an equity injection of \$40 million and a revolving loan facility of \$50 million;
- more targeted use of public housing 87 per cent of new allocations are made to applicants in urgent need, compared with just 38 per cent nationally;
- improving the energy efficiency of public housing to reduce bills for tenants;
- a pilot program to help young tenants build supportive community networks;
- two demonstration villages to showcase affordable land and housing packages; and
- a design award for excellence in affordable housing.

Labor is now working on Phase II of our Affordable Housing Action Plan, focusing on affordable accommodation for older Canberrans – particularly those of modest means – and the homeless.

In addition to this Labor has:

Increased indexation to community sector funding annually, which has risen to 4%, to maintain the viability of the sector to ensure that high-quality services continue to be provided to the Canberra community;

- Provided \$4.4 million for the ACT's most disadvantaged through the Community Inclusion Fund;
- Invested \$2 million over 4 years to Anglicare's Junction Youth Health services in Tuggeranong and Gungahlin to employ two Youth Health Nurses and two Youth Health Workers to improve the health and well-being of young people in these areas;

Invested \$1.9 million recurrent to provide new 24-hour step-up, step-down innovative model of mental health facilities for both adults and youth. The youth facility was the first of its kind in the country:

Provided \$3.9 million to fund 14 youth homelessness services. This investment has include the innovative Couch Surfing, Transitional Support for Young People Exiting Detention and the Outreach Support Young People Transition to Independence projects to support young homeless people;

Invested \$9 million per year into the services and support for the homeless, in addition to the Commonwealths \$6 million annual investment;

- Increased supported accommodation places for families by over 30 per cent to to 124 in 2007-08;
- Invested close to \$1 million in an Early Morning Drop in Centre at Pilgrim Place since 2004;
- ⁿ Negotiated and agreed a Social Compact with the sector;
- Introduced a Charter of Rights for the homeless;
- Increased funding to homelessness by 74% since 2001;
- Successfully implemented Breaking the Cycle the ACT Homelessness Strategy;
- Improved housing services and implementing reforms aimed at providing a more targeted and responsive system to the needs of Housing ACT tenants;
- introduced revised housing assistance legislation and a new Public Rental Housing Assistance Program which more effectively provides housing to those most in need in the community:
- Significantly cut waiting times by 66 per cent, for those most in need waiting for public housing;
- Increased public housing property numbers from 11,454 to 11,551;
- Housing applicants in need of priority housing (as at 2 September 2008) within 52 days compared to in excess of 9 months under the previous allocation system;
- Effectively developed links with community organisations, in particular with the homelessness sector in building on a service continuum that supports people as they transition from homelessness into sustainable public housing tenancies;
- Implemented Breaking the Cycle the ACT Homelessness Strategy the Government's key policy commitment to improving responses to homelessness;
- implemented a Transitional Housing Program which ensures that clients exiting crisis accommodation can continue to receive critical support services while waiting for longer term housing options;
- more effectively utilised housing stock by encouraging residents to move to properties which better meet their needs; and
- Introduced a regulatory framework for non-profit housing providers to help protect the rights of tenants living in properties managed by not-for-profit providers.

What Labor delivered in its most recent Budget 2008-09 to help more Canberrans into homes

In the 2008-09 Budget the ACT Labor Government has:

- Boosted community housing with an equity injection of \$40 million and a revolving2loan facility of \$50 million;
- Provided greater support for children in public housing by undertaking a needs assessment to ensure that public housing appropriately takes account of the needs of children in the allocation of properties;
- Improved the energy efficiency of public housing and accelerated work to improve water efficiency of public housing by providing \$20m over 10 years;
- Provided an additional 52 dwelling units for public housing and a further 26 will be provided by the final funding instalment of \$10m in 2008-09;

Approved a budget for capital expenditure on public housing in 2008-2009 of \$82.6 million; and

Provided additional homelessness services for women over 55 with an additional \$40,000 invested.

What a re-elected ACT Labor Government will do to increase housing options for Canberrans

Increasing the supply of affordable housing in our city

Require 20 per cent of all new estates to be made up of affordable housing, under \$300,000

ACT Labor will increase the supply of affordable housing by requiring at least 20 per cent of all new estates to be made up of affordable house and land packages under \$300,000.

The ACT Labor Government mandated that at least 15 per cent of all new estates be made up of affordable house and land packages, through its nation-leading *Affordable Housing Action Plan*. These affordable blocks have consistently been in high demand and been the first to sell. By increasing this requirement to 20 per cent, there will be more affordable house and land packages for homebuyers.

This is not inclusionary zoning as it requires the provision of appropriately prices homes of varying sizes in a development. The affordable homes would be made up of different products, including smaller blocks and smaller floorplans. These homes would not be affordable due to any subsidy.

Extend the affordable housing requirement to all types of homes, including townhouses and apartments

Labor appreciates that many Canberrans want to live closer to town centres in denser developments. ACT Labor will extend the 20% affordable housing mandate to other kinds of developments, including attached houses, apartments and townhouses.

Incentives to convert surplus C-grade office blocks to affordable housing
Canberra enjoys a low level of office vacancy. However, there is a growing demand for Agrade and B-grade space, leaving pockets of C-grade office accommodation vacant at times.
Such surplus offices are often located in town centres, in areas of high demand, and could be
transformed into affordable accommodation.

ACT Labor will provide incentives for owners of surplus C-grade office blocks to transform their properties into affordable housing, slashing change-of-use charges for owners who build affordable apartments in town centres and the City. Labor will reduce change-of-use charges associated with lease variations by 75 per cent for all owners of C-grade office space who agree to build affordable apartments for under \$300,000.

This will lead to greater population density around town centres which, in turn, will help our town centre thrive and provide greater opportunities for sustainable transport options such as better public transport hubs.

Increase the supply of affordable rental accommodation through the institutional investor program

ACT Labor will continue to work with institutional investors and the housing industry to deliver an extra 400 rental properties. As part of the *Affordable Housing Action Plan*, the ACT Labor Government has sought expressions of interest from institutional investors to form a partnership with government to deliver more affordable rental accommodation in Canberra.

Expressions of interest for this initiative have been short-listed and those short-listed have been asked to expand their proposals to provide up to 400 affordable rental properties in the ACT. A re-elected ACT Labor Government will see this initiative to fruition with institutional investors selected to provide more affordable rental properties around Canberra.

Maintain a supply of release-ready land

ACT Labor will maintain an adequate supply of release-ready land. This will ensure that any sudden movements in demand for housing can be catered for through the immediate release of land which is ready to be built on.

Due to the surge in the housing market over the past few years, the supply of release-ready, ready to be built on, land has diminished. Labor will ensure that all planned future land releases have the trunk infrastructure ahead of their predicted release dates. This will mean that all new greenfields land bought will be ready to be built on immediately after settlement.

<u>Helping more Canberrans into housing and helping them keep their</u> <u>homes</u>

Establish a Mortgage Relief Fund to help Canberrans at risk of losing their homes Rising interest rates have driven average mortgage repayments for Canberra families up by \$250 a month. Changes in the lending market have seen the rise of low-doc lenders. In the ACT, repossessions have risen by over 50 per cent, from 55 in 2004 to 83 in 2006¹. Losing a family home is devastating.

ACT Labor will establish a Mortgage Relief Fund to help households in grave mortgage stress. The program will focus on households who are experiencing difficulties with their home loan repayments, as a result of an unforeseen change in their circumstances. Labor will provide one-off payments of upto \$5,000 to households who have exhausted all other options and are at risk of losing their family home.

ACT Labor will also provide \$50,000 a year to a consumer advocacy and assistance organisations to monitor repossessions and lending practices. By obtaining detailed data, better knowledge can be gained – and passed on to the community – about the types of loans that get households into financial strife.

ACT Labor will continue to work with the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) to create uniform consumer credit regulations. National reform will eliminate loopholes and allow better regulation of the credit sector, diminishing the potential for unscrupulous lenders to take advantage of buyers.

Implement shared equity schemes to assist low-to-moderate income households become homeowners

ACT Labor is committed to implementing shared equity schemes so that public housing and community housing tenants can realise the dream of home ownership. Shared equity schemes allow households on low incomes to purchase a proportion of their homes, with the housing provider or financier providing the remaining proportion. The program will assist public housing tenants to progressively purchase their property. The program will be carefully monitored to ensure families participating avoid financial stress.

ACT Labor will continue to work with CHC Affordable Housing to establish a shared equity scheme for community housing tenants. In February 2008, the ACT Labor Government exchanged contracts with CHC Affordable Housing, the ACT's community housing provider, for a \$50 million revolving finance facility to allow CHC to provide 1,000 affordable homes for

sale and rent. CHC, in consultation with Housing ACT, is investigating the provision of a shared equity scheme for community housing tenants.

ACT Labor will also continue to work with the Council of Australian Governments and the Australian Housing Ministers' Council to find a nationally collaborative approach to shared equity.

Implement a homeshare program

ACT Labor will commit \$50,000 a year to provide a homeshare program to provide accommodation for low-income singles or students, while supporting older Canberrans to remain in their homes. Due to changes in personal circumstances, many older Canberrans live alone in their family home, where their children were raised. This program will help many empty-nesters remain in their homes, as they share their home with a boarder or lodger.

\$600,000 to establish the HOME Service

One of the most common challenges in attracting prospective migrants to Canberra is accommodation. ACT Labor will commit \$600,000 to create the HOME (Housing Options and Moving Enquiries) Service. This new service will be a one-stop shop for all enquiries related to housing in the ACT.

The HOME Service will provide advice to Canberrans and people looking to move to Canberra about where they can get access to housing whether they're looking to buy or rent. It will also point people in the direction of relevant concessions and options they have when buying their own home, such as land rent. The service will provide information about upcoming land releases and when englobo housing developments are due for sale direct to homebuyers.

The HOME Service will operate within the *Live in Canberra* unit to provide housing information to intending and existing residents.

Continue to fully implement the Affordable Housing Action Plan and embark on Phase two with a focus on aged accommodation and homelessness

ACT Labor will fully implement all of the first phase of its Affordable Housing Action Plan. Labor will continue its accelerated land release program aimed at stablising the cost of land and housing in the ACT. We will continue to monitor the land supply pipeline to ensure that there are appropriate responses to land supply in the future. Labor will continue to work with CHC Affordable Housing to ensure it delivers up to 1,000 affordable dwellings by 2017. Labor will continue to develop innovative examples of sustainable and accessible housing to encourage more options for sustainable living in our neighbourhoods. We will continue to fund the affordable housing design awards to inspire and encourage innovative affordable housing design.

Building on our nation-leading Affordable Housing Action Plan, a re-elected Labor Government will embark on Phase II, focusing on affordable accommodation options for older Canberrans, particularly those on modest incomes, along with the homeless.

Labor will explore, report on and implement, in collaboration with industry and the community, innovative options for providing affordable and appropriate accommodation for an ageing population, including 'virtual villages', group houses, and other options for ageing in the community.

Labor will continue to work with the Commonwealth

ACT Labor will continue to work through COAG, to implement the Commonwealth Rent Assistance Scheme, currently being reviewed by the COAG Housing Working Group. Labor will work together with other jurisdictions to review tax regimes through a new National Affordable Housing Agreement and will continue to work to address homelessness and supported accommodation through the Coalition of Australian Governments.



Helping more Canberrans find a place to call home

\$720,000 for expansions to Transitional Housing

ACT Labor will provide \$720,000 over for years to expand the Transitional Housing Program for Canberrans experiencing or at risk of homelessness and also to support refugees. The Transitional Housing Program has been a success story for those Canberrans experiencing or at risk of homelessness providing transitional accommodation for those moving out of crisis to long-term, settled living. Transitional houses, provided by ACT Housing, are matched with resourcing for outreach services provided by local Canberra NGO's.

ACT Labor will provide an additional \$80,000 per year for an expansion to the existing program and will seek to address a gap in housing for families, particularly women with children escaping domestic violence.

We will also provide \$400,000 to expand the Refugee Transitional Housing Program, a partnership between Companion House, Centacare and Housing ACT. ACT Labor will double the number of homes available for the program from 8 to 16 and will include additional outreach support and material assistance for clients in transitioning to longer-term housing arrangements.

\$600,000 Upgrade of Homeless Food Services

The Pilgrim House Early Morning Centre provides a vital food service for Canberra's rough sleepers. ACT Labor has prioritised funding to this service, recognising its ability to assist services engage with our homeless living on the streets. ACT Labor will build further on our investment with a \$600,000 building upgrade at Pilgrim House to increase space and enhance facilities for the service.

ACT Labor will also work with the Pilgrim House management to examine the creation of a dinner service at Pilgrim House.

Community Outreach for rough sleepers, particularly young people

Complimenting our investment for food services for rough sleepers, ACT Labor will commit \$800,000 over 4 years to fund community outreach workers, equipped with transport, to travel around the city to known 'hang-outs' of rough sleepers. These community workers will concentrate particularly on places where young people frequent, such as shopping centres, libraries and nature reserves.

Introduce a program to voluntarily transfer public housing tenants to housing that better matches their needs

Following extensive community consultation, guidelines for this voluntary program have been developed which include consideration of individual circumstances, tenant preferences and possible assistance with removal expenses.

Continue to house tenants into public housing as soon as possible

ACT Labor will continue to house Canberrans most in need who apply for public housing as soon as possible. New waiting list categories were introduced in June 2006 ensuring that those most in need were housed in less time. Applicants are now assessed according to need and whether their circumstances meet the criteria for Priority, High Needs or Standard housing. Canberrans who are Priority or High Needs include those families who are homeless, have mental health issues, serious medical issues or a disability, or may be frailaged. These applicants may also include people with a disability where the natural support

systems are at risk of breaking down, women (with or without children) escaping domestic violence, indigenous people facing complex issues and families with children at risk.

The average waiting time for those most in need is now around 50 days as compared to over nine months under the previous system.

Continue to make public housing more sustainable

ACT Labor is committed to making our public housing more sustainable and energy efficient through a \$10 million investment over 10 years. Labor will continue to implement this rolling program to provide more sustainable housing facilities for our tenants. These improvements include improvements to wall and ceiling insulation and energy efficiency of hot water systems and heating appliances.

This builds on Labor's commitment of \$500,000 over the past two years to improve water efficiency in our public housing. Funding for water efficiency improvements to public housing of \$0.5m over 2 years (2007-2008 and 2008-2009) has provided dual flush toilets, water saving shower heads, flow retardation devices and boundary limiting values.

Through these energy modifications by ACT Labor not only will public housing dwellings be more energy efficient, the cost of living for those on lesser incomes will also be reduced.

\$1 million for Building Housing Partnerships

ACT Labor will provide \$1 million over four years to support young people, aged persons, vulnerable families, and Indigenous families residing in public and community housing, and transitioning from homelessness through the Building Housing Partnerships initiative. This initiative will help to break cycles of homelessness and disadvantage through providing additional support such as:

- living skills programs for vulnerable families, including support to find training and employment
- assistance for elderly tenants with minor household tasks and to maintain social contact with the community, to facilitate ageing in place,
- tailored housing support for tenants with diverse needs
- culturally appropriate support for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families
- Extension of the Youth Housing Program to assist young people in public housing to reestablish links with education and training and to find employment

Labor acknowledges that there are a range of factors which contribute to people and families experiencing housing difficulty, which is why our Housing policy is backed by strong community development, family support, employment and skills and education policies that will assist Canberrans address challenges they may experience in their lives.

Protecting Canberrans in their homes

\$100,000 seed funding for Kids Under Cover

Kids Under Cover won the 2008 Victoria Day Award for Community and Public Service. They provide an early-intervention model to assist families in crisis stay together with temporary accommodation for young people and the provision of support services. ACT Labor will provide Kids Under Cover with \$100,000 seed funding to establish a hub in Canberra.

Labor will Increase awareness about rental bidding

Competition for rental properties in the ACT has been strong over recent years. This has led to an anecdotal increase in rental bidding - when an agent invites a prospective tenant to bid more than the advertised price, when an agent advertises a property with a price range, or when there is no rental price advertised. While rental bidding - rent auctions – are illegal under existing ACT law, Labor believes an information campaign will help inform Canberrans about the effects of rental bidding.

ACT Labor will commit \$50,000 a year towards a campaign to inform and educate real estate agents on rental bidding and the harmful effects it can have on renters. The campaign will also target renters informing them of the impact that rental bidding can have on the rents that they pay.

Labor will look after our ageing

As our community ages, more Canberrans will make the choice to relocate to retirement villages or other residential aged care facilities. ACT Labor will explore avenues for legislating to protect the financial and other rights of Canberrans purchasing homes in retirement villages, including the rights of those who seek to leave such villages. These laws will build on work and community consultation already begun by Labor backbencher Mary Porter MLA.

Continue to work with all concerned to address disruptive behaviour in public housing ACT Labor believes that all Canberrans have the right to feel safe and secure in their homes. Labor will continue to protect the rights of all Canberrans in their homes, including public housing tenants.

Labor recognises that governments have a social responsibility to assist people and those around them to resolve issues through support services such as anger management and alcohol and drug counselling. A recent amendment to the *Residential Tenancies Act* provides additional options other than an application for eviction if support programs are unable to remedy the situation.

ACT Labor will continue to work with community support providers to provide support services to public housing tenants who are experiencing difficulties with their neighbours.

A Proud Record of Investment in Canberra's Transport System

ACT Labor recognises that transport is central to any planning for the future development of our city.

That's why we have incorporated transport into our guiding policy documents – the Territory Plan, the Spatial Plan, the Sustainable Transport Plan, the Accessible Public Transport Action Plan, the ACT Affordable Housing Strategy, and Weathering the Change – the ACT Climate Strategy 2007-2025. Our long-term vision has been outlined in the Integrated Transport Framework, released in August 2008, which focuses on improving efficiency right across the transport system, addressing traffic congestion, minimising emissions and giving the community greater transport options.

ACT Labor has made significant investments in improving public transport and transport infrastructure, including developing an integrated transport framework that draws together sustainable transport, public transport, road safety, the taxi system, cycleways, pedestrian access, community transport needs, car parking and road infrastructure.

As part of ACT Labor's *Building the Future* program, announced in the 2008/09 Budget, we are investing \$250 million over the next five years in transport infrastructure.

ACT Labor is determined to make a sustainable public transport system a real option for Canberrans, but also recognises the reality that the car will remain as the main form of transport for many.

The legacy of our physical sprawl and our relative affluence mean the private car remains the most common means of transport, with nearly 84% of all Canberrans making their way to work by car.

Since being elected in 2001, ACT Labor has managed the growth of our city, recognising that we need to grow in a sustainable way. We have set the city on a course that sees both new developments on the outskirts of our city such as in Gungahlin, as well as in inner areas such as East Lake and Molonglo. We also recognise the need for new housing, especially affordable housing, to be available in our suburbs, close to town centres and the city.

Canberra is experiencing demographic shifts. We now have smaller household sizes and an ageing population creating demand for a more diverse range of housing options for our community and the need for flexible planning policies that provide for these demands.

ACT Labor has also established the independent Planning and Land Authority and vested power in this independent Authority to make decisions regarding development assessment. This has ensured decisions regarding developments are independent of political interference and that decisions are being made by experts in the planning field.

ACT Labor has reformed our planning system. Laying out a planning vision

ACT Labor believes in the need to balance the development and growth of Canberra with the environmental and social sustainability of our community. We also believe in informing the community of the direction planning in the ACT is taking.

ACT Labor has:

 Established and released The Canberra Plan, to guide the development of Canberra over the coming generation;

 Developed and released The Canberra Spatial Plan to provide the community with information about the planning and development of Canberra over the next 30 years. It is the Territory's key strategic planning document for directing and managing urban growth and change and reflects the community's views on where the future of our city lies; and

Issued its second Statement of Planning Intent in June 2007 to inform the community and guide planning policy in the ACT for coming years. ACT Labor has identified among its priorities providing affordable housing for Canberrans, responding to climate change and building

Gungahlin.

Making houses more affordable

ACT Labor believes one of the most fundamental rights for a Canberrans is access to safe and affordable housing. In recent years Canberra, like many other parts of Australia, has faced a crisis in housing affordability with rising house prices and interest rates taking the dream of home ownership further away from many families.

In 2007, the ACT Labor Government produced the Affordable Housing Action Plan. This Plan comprises a number of initiatives to making housing more affordable across Canberra. The action plan included 62 initiatives to help increase the supply of affordable housing including the introduction of more compact housing, the development of a land rent scheme, increased levels of

land supply, greater levels of community housing and more affordable housing partnerships with private sector investors.

ACT Labor along with industry and the community have achieved a great deal together, with all 62 initiatives contained in the original plan now actioned.

Since the release of the Affordable Housing Action Plan, the ACT Labor Government has:

- Released a record 3,400 blocks to the market in 2007-08 and adopted a new rolling five-year land release program;
- Streamlined land release and approval processes, and englobo land releases;
- Funded extra positions within the ACT Planning and Land Authority to discourage land banking and ensure land is being built on in a timely fashion;
- Introduced new fees for developers not meeting their statutoary timeframe in building on new blocks of land;
- Mandated the delivery of house and land packages priced between \$200,000 and \$300,000;
- Provided stamp duty concessions for low-income earners and pensioners;
- Increased the stamp duty income threshold by 20 per cent to \$120,000;
- Allowed the deferral of stamp duty payment for up to 5 years for eligible home buyers;
- Introduced the land rent provision to enable more low-income families to purchase their own home;
- Invited institutional investors to provide affordable private rental accommodation;
- Boosted community housing with an equity injection of \$40 million and a loan facility of \$50 million;
- Ensured that better and more targeted use is made of public housing -87 per cent of new allocations are made to applicants in urgent need of housing compared with just over 38 per cent nationally;
- Implemented measures to improve the energy efficiency of the public housing stock to reduce energy costs for public housing tenants;
- Commenced a pilot program aimed at helping young tenants to build supportive community networks;
- Released two demonstration villages to showcase affordable land and housing packages; and

Funded a design award for excellence in affordable housing.

Responding to climate change

ACT Labor recognises that future planning of our city has a major impact on our environmental sustainability and we are committed to growing our city in a sustainable way. We have been working with the community and experts in an effort to establish planning policies and regulations that reduce our impact on the environment.

To help combat the effects of climate change on our community, ACT Labor has:

Required all new housing to have a 5 star energy rating;

 Established the Water Sensitive Urban Design guidelines, requiring a 40% reduction in drinking water use in new developments;

Priotritised sustainability in the design of our newest development,
 Molonglo. Molonglo will have ready access to major transport routes
 and will improve social amenities available to the existing region to
 Weston Creek which Molonglo will border;

 Formed a partnership with the CSIRO for the development of East Lake, ensuring the area is a nation-leading showcase of sustainability;

 Released publications designed to help Canberrans build and live in more environmentally sustainable homes including:

 Building better homes for Canberra's climate which provides information about how to best orientate houses for optimal winter warmth and summer cooling thus reducing the need for energy intensive heating and cooling systems. The document also shows how to reduce energy use through insulation and glazing and how to minimise water use;

 Your Home: Renovator's Guide contains useful checklists to help people improve the environmental impact of their home

when renovating; and

 Selecting a Greener, Better House is a checklist to help people know what to look for in a house they are considering buying or renting.

Making our planning system simpler, faster and more effective

ACT Labor has worked with industry and the community to design a planning system that cuts regulation but still allows Government to ensure that the community's environmental, social and economic future is considered in every planning decision.

ACT Labor has:

 Implemented a new planning system through the development of a new Territory Plan and a new Planning and Development Act;

- Adopted a national best practice planning model to ensure the ACT leads the nation in planning processes and outcomes;
- Cut red tape by increasing the amount of simple building work which is exempt from assessment;
- Added to housing affordability by making housing in greenfield areas, that comply with the rules, exempt from the Development Assessment process;
- Simplified the system for all those who come into contact with it, with a new track system for all developments;
- Consolidated and simplified the Territory Plan to make it easier to use;
 and
- Signed a bilateral agreement between the ACT Labor Government and the Federal Labor Government that will see both Commonwealth and ACT environmental impact assessment requirements integrated into one joint process.

Protecting our Garden City

ACT Labor has introduced new planning regulations that aim to protect the amenity of life in our suburbs while at the same time providing housing options in our suburbs close to town centres and the city.

ACT Labor has:

- Ended the unrestrained high density re-development of our suburban streets that occurred under the previous Liberal Government by introducing the Garden City provisions; and
- Protected 85% of Canberra suburbs from high density re-development
- Recently further tightened regulations, restricting suburban streets from high-density apartment developments.

Planning for the future

ACT Labor recognises the need for our city to continue to change and develop as our community grows. Under ACT Labor, Canberra has continued to prosper as we have revitalised older parts of our city through new planning regulations, as well a built up new areas.

Civic: The heart of our city

ACT Labor believes that a strong, vibrant city centre is essential for maintaining a high quality of life for Canberrans and we have begun revitalizing our city centre in an effort to breathe life back into our city and make it a hub of activity for Canberrans.

ACT Labor has:

 Developed the Canberra Central program which has resulted in the revitalisation of city west, Childer's street and City Hill;

- Worked with the ANU to develop the ANU Exchange in City West, creating a hub of activity and employment in that area of the city;
- Revitalised Childers Street, with new street furnishings and pavements to complement the ANU Exchange development;
- Upgraded the western end of City Walk, with new a new streetscape and paving, creating a link between eastern and western Civic;
- Released section 63 in the city for major development that can include retail, residential and commercial space; and
- Released and completed development on Section 83 in the city, with Queensland Investment Corporation bringing a major retail hub to the area as well as creating an employment centre.

Revitalising Braddon

The Braddon commercial area provides a range of services for city workers and local residents. Over the past 20 years the area has developed a unique character, merging light industry and car yards with art galleries, outdoor shops and restaurants. This transition has been gradual, resulting in a character that contrasts with other areas of the city.

ACT Labor has:

- Recognised the unique character of this area and completed a planning study to investigate how to better utilise Braddon;
- Changed planning regulations to allow for greater height limits and the better mixing of retail, residential and commercial uses; and
- Allowed for the revitalisation and modernisation of Braddon through planning outcomes that encourage more use of the area by Canberrans, making the area more cosmopolitan.

More services and better infrastructure for Gungahlin

Recognising the rapid growth of the Gungahlin community and the demand for community facilities and infrastructure, ACT Labor has expedited the delivery of several community facilities.

ACT Labor has:

- Provided for employment growth in Gungahlin town centre by increasing the amount of commercial land that will be released in coming years and removing the height restrictions on buildings, so as to encourage a commonwealth agency to relocate to Gungahlin;
- Completed the Gungahlin Town Centre Planning Study and consulted with the Gungahlin community on future development of the Town Centre;
- Provided \$61.7 million for a new secondary college in Gungahlin. This includes a joint secondary college, community library and CIT campus;
- Funded the design of an enclosed oval for Gungahlin. This competition facility is to be designed to accommodate AFL as well as rectangular football codes like league, union and soccer;

 Committed \$20 million, if re-elected, to the building an aquatic centre for Gungahlin, including a 50m pool and courts for indoor sport;

• Invested over \$325,000 to design a public park to be located with the

Gungahlin College; and

 Invested \$18 million for the construction of a community health centre in Gungahlin.

Modernising Belconnen

ACT Labor has recognised that Belconnen Town Centre is in need of revitalization. .

ACT Labor has:

- Changed the planning guidelines for Belconnen to allow a major town centre upgrade which will include an expansion and reconfiguration of Belconnen Westfield; and
- Committed \$16 million over the next three years to replace the Belconnen bus interchange with a new facility fully integrated with Belconnen Mall. This will allow safer and more convenient access to the bus interchange from the shopping centre.

Rejuvinating Woden

ACT Labor recognises the need to draw more people to Woden Town Centre to live, work and relax.

ACT Labor has:

- Changed planning regulations to reflect the Woden Town Centre Master Plan to allow for a wider range of development in the Centre;
- Protected the Phillip Pool and Ice Skating Rink in the Territory Plan, ensuring the continuation of recreation facilities for the Woden community:
- Invested over \$3m in upgrading Phillip Oval;
- Committed, if re-elected, to providing a performing arts centre at Canberra College for wider use by the Woden community; and
- Created more than 350 new parking spaces to help support community facilities such as the oval and the Swimming and Ice Skating Centre.

Moving Forward

Preparing for the future

ACT Labor will build on the work already undertaken in areas such as Woden, Belconnen and Braddon and investigate ways of preparing our town centres and group centres for the future.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

- Invest \$400,000 in master plans for Kingston and Dickson group centres. The master plans will examine the needs of the community and businesses of Kingston and Dickson and provide a long-term planning strategy that reflects the community's needs and those of the business community. The Plans will focus on the improvement of the group centres of Kingston and Dickson;
- Examine whether there is enough access to supermarkets in these areas with a view to ensuring greater competition amongst retailers and greater choice for consumers; and
- Invest \$200,000 in a planning study and master plan for the Tuggeranong Town Centre.

Promoting Sustainable Housing

ACT Labor is committed to informing Canberrans of the measures they can take when building, renovating or buying a home, to help combat climate change.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

- Invest \$400,000 over four years in a communication campaign to inform Canberrans how they can contribute to combating climate change through sustainable housing choices;
- Distribute three publications designed to help Canberrans build and live in more environmentally sustainable homes. The Publications are:
 - Building better homes for Canberra's climate was produced by the ACT Planning and Land Authority and provides information about how to best orientate houses for optimal winter warmth and summer cooling. It also advises on how to reduce energy use through use of insulation and glazing and how to minimise water use;
 - o Your Home: Renovator's Guide was produced by the RMIT with funding and support provided by most Australian Governments including the Stanhope Government. The Guide contains useful checklists that will help people think through their options when renovating their homes;
 - Selecting a Greener, Better House is a checklist to help people know what to look for in a house they are considering buying or renting;

- Continue to play an important role at a national level in developing responses to climate change through the built environment. This includes national principles for energy and water reduction through land use and infrastructure design, national targets for energy efficiency for buildings, participation in the preparation of the 'your development' package and the response to the National Adaptation Framework;
- Continue our partnership with the CSIRO to create one of Australia's most sustainable communities at East Lake; and
- Bring high levels of environmental standards to the development of Molonglo following on from the Strategic Environmental Assessment currently being jointly undertaken by the Commonwealth and ACT Governments.

More solar efficient housing

Part of combating climate change is ensuring new developments are as environmentally sustainable as possible.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

- Mandate passive solar orientation of blocks in new subdivisions;
- Immediately require 100% of stand-alone blocks in new subdivisions to have a solar star rating of 3 or above. Currently the subdivision code requires a 75% threshold;
- Investigate with industry and the community a threshold for compact blocks and multi-unit developments;
- Engage with industry to review the sub-division rating tool, which has not been reviewed since the early 1990s, with a view to linking block and house rating tools to allow for a better melding of house design and block orientation;
- Consult with industry to alter the current solar access rules in the Territory Plan to ensure a better mechanism for measuring energy gain rather than just a simple amount of sunlight required. For example, currently there needs to be a minimum of three hours direct sunlight, the changes will instead measure energy gained from the sun throughout the day;
- Work with the community and industry to implement, over the next ten years, carbon targets for entire estates. This would entail identifying a carbon target or limit for the entirety of a new suburb or estate development; and
- Develop and implement legislation protecting solar rights.

Molonglo

Molonglo, Canberra's newest community, is an example of ACT Labor's commitment to reducing unsustainable urban expansion and to establishing homes within a 7.5km of the City Centre. The planning for Molonglo and North Weston embodies an integrated approach to social, economic, environmental and transport planning.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

- Release land for homes in North Weston and Molonglo;
- Plan and set aside land for community services such as libraries, shopping centres, health and medical facilities, child care centres, and sport and recreation facilities for the Molonglo community;
- Establish high levels of connectivity between neighbourhoods to allow for walking as well as shared bicycle and pedestrian paths;
- Maintain open space corridors throughout Molonglo that link Stromlo Forest Park, the Molonglo Rover Corridor and the Canberra International Arboretum;
- Assess Molonglo as one of the areas for light rail;
- Guarantee no development of central Molonglo;
- Retain the existing pockets of Yellow Box-Gum Grassy Woodland in East Molonglo;
- Locate bushfire buffer zones outside the Kama Nature Reserve; and
- Investigate storm water management options and undertake an EIS and community consultation on the preferred option.

Protecting our suburbs

ACT Labor believes we need to continue to find the right balance between growing and developing our city and maintaining the high quality and amenity of life Canberrans cherish.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government:

- Guarantees no return to the rampant over re-development of our suburbs that occurred under the previous Liberal Government;
- Will continue to monitor the garden city provisions to ensure the balance between growth and amenity is achieved; and
- Will continue to allow some redevelopment in suburban areas to accommodate the different housing demands of Canberrans as our demographics shift and to provide housing alternatives in suburbs close to our town centres and our city centre.

Community engagement

ACT Labor is committed to consulting with the community on all planning issues in the Territory.

To ensure maximum community engagement in planning, a re-elected ACT Labor government will:

 Require all development applications to have bigger notification signs in line with the size of the development. The minimum size for notification signage will rise to 600mm x 900mm, and will be full colour;

Signs for large developments, falling in the impact track, will be

required to be 1200mm x 900mm; and

 Streamline where notices are put in the Canberra Times, with one community noticeboard for all Government announcements, including development assessment notifications.

Managing Canberra's growth

As Canberra's population grows and demand for new and affordable housing increases, ACT Labor will continue to plan new suburbs in accordance with the Canberra Spatial Plan.

Along with providing for new growth in appropriate areas, ACT Labor has continued to plan for residential intensification in existing areas of the city.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

 Release land in North Weston and Molonglo, providing sustainable housing for Canberrans close to town centres and other amenities;

Release land in the East Lake development, set to be one of Australia's most sustainable developments. East Lake is located just 4.5km from Civic and incorporating parts of Kingston, Griffith and Fyshwick. East Lake aims to become a high-density urban community providing an Australian showcase of sustainable development. The ACT Government has partnered with the CSIRO to ensure the use of leading edge science and innovation in the area of sustainability. Over the past year, various technical investigations and extensive community consultation has been undertaken;

Continue to develop and grow Gungahlin with land release and new

community facilities; and

Continue to undertake work with the NSW Government to ensure sustainable growth in the capital region. ACT Labor is developing, with the NSW Government, an ACT/NSW Cross Border Region Settlement Strategy, having regard to the Canberra Spatial Plan and the Sydney to Canberra Corridor Regional Strategy. The Settlement Strategy and the 2006 Cross Border Settlement Memorandum of Understanding will ensure growth management and sustainable development within the Capital region.

Employment Growth

ACT Labor will continue to plan for future employment growth in Canberra.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will complete the Eastern Broadacre Planning Study. This study is examining an eastern corridor of the ACT, identified in *The Canberra Spatial Plan* for the growth of industrial, commercial, broadacre, tourism and other uses. The area is in close proximity to the city, existing industrial areas at Hume and Fyshwick, and existing transport infrastructure including the Monaro Highway and Canberra International Airport. It is envisaged that further planning in this area would see employment consolidated into precincts that are well served by public transport and easily accessed from proposed residential projects at East Lake, Queanbeyan City Council, and in the long term, at Kowen.

Skills and Training

ACT Labor knows how important it is to provide Canberrans with the skills needed to ensure our community and economy continue to thrive.

It is vital we have a well-trained and skilled workforce if we are to protect the economic health of the ACT now and into the future.

We are also committed to providing Canberrans with the best opportunities to reach their full potential in education and in life.

In response to the emerging skills shortage, ACT Labor acted quickly by establishing the ACT Skills Commission to work out ways for the Government and the Canberra community to meet the challenge of increasing our skilled workforce.

The ACT Labor Government responded with its ACT Skills Future Strategy. This strategy focussed on four themes:

- People and Workforce attracting and retaining skilled workers and their families from interstate and overseas;
- Productivity aiming to increase the productivity of our workers through encouraging employee access and participation in formal and informal training;
- Participation lifting workforce participation by encouraging those people who have traditionally been unable to participate, or fully participate, in the workforce to do so; and
- Education and training ensuring the ACT education and training system is responsive to the needs of participants, industry and the economy.

ACT Labor has backed this strategy with a record \$51 million in funding and will continue to prioritise policies and strategies to increase the skills of our workforce – for the good of our economy and our community.

ACT Labor has been able to do all this, and deliver much more, because we have been strong economic managers which has allowed us to invest in fostering, supporting and building a skilled community.

A Proud Record of Building a Skilled Community

ACT Labor is committed to providing opportunities for all Canberrans to increase their skills and believes that investment in vocational education and training is essential if we are to be ready for the future.

Currently about 70% of Canberra's school students do not go on to university but instead pursue other pathways into study and work.

ACT Labor has made a record investment in building a skilled community and has introduced a range of policies and strategies to increase the skills of our workforce.

Our Record

To support vocational education and training in the Territory, the ACT Labor Government has:

- Increased funding for the Canberra Institute of Technology (CIT) by 15.5% since being elected – a stark contrast to the 25% cut under the previous Liberal government;
- Funded the establishment of the CIT Vocational College offering essential skills and jobs training for around 3,000 youths, mature aged and migrant workers;
- Invested heavily in new infrastructure at the CIT including \$9 million for a new, state of the art horticulture centre at the Bruce Campus;
- Provided an extra \$4 million in user choice funding to meet the demand for Australian apprenticeships;
- Provided an additional \$3.4 million for teachers to help with careers and pathways planning in our colleges and high schools;
- Invested \$2.495 million over four years in CIT to deliver an additional 35,000 hours training for students;
- Invested an extra \$1 million into CIT for a technology upgrade, to ensure students are learning with the best equipment;
- Funded the feasibility and design for a new CIT Trade Skills Centre at Fyshwick and for the upgrade of the Reid campus;
- Provided extra support for students with a disability at CIT;
- Supported Australian School Based Apprentices, with this year's goal to be 500 apprentices in our schools;
- Worked with CIT and industry to provide accelerated apprenticeships in areas such as panel beating, hairdressing and cheffing;

The ACT Labor Government has also:

Re-established the ACT Skilled and Business Migration Program in 2005 to sponsor skilled workers and business investors from overseas to come and work in the ACT. Since July 2005 over 2,734 skilled workers, business investors and their dependents have been sponsored by the ACT Government. The sponsored skilled migrants will transfer over \$68 million into the ACT for settlement purposes. The sponsored business migrants have invested over \$74 million into the ACT economy;

 Established the Live in Canberra program to attract and retain skilled workers and their families from around Australia, and to work with the Skilled and Business Migration program on international recruitment;

 Established the ACT Skills Commission, chaired by ANU Vice Chancellor Prof Ian Chubb and later Mr Derek Volker, which reported in May 2008 on skills issues and possible solutions;

 Published its ACT Skills Future strategy responding to the Skills Commission Report and fed into the 2008-09 ACT Budget, which

- Funded an expansion of the ACT Government's analysis and projection work in areas of expected and current skills shortage in the ACT;
- Introduced a new recruitment campaign for the ACT Public Service - Great careers come with the Territory;

Implemented a new long-service-leave scheme for the ACT community sector;

 Provided additional resources to Volunteering ACT to support the Students Participating in Community Enterprise, which provides work experience and skills for young people in danger of not completing year 10;

 Provided an additional \$1.2 million for the Skilled and Business Migration Program, to link final-year and graduating international students with potential employers and increase traineeships and apprenticeships in the ACT Public Service; and

Provided \$4.2 million to strengthen the ACT's existing health workforce and a boost for the *Live in Canberra* campaign.

The 2008-09 ACT Budget

The ACT Labor Government moved quickly to implement the initiatives identified in the ACT Skills Future Strategy, through providing significant new funding in the 2008-09 Budget.

The ACT Labor Government's 2008-09 Budget identified \$51 million over four years (comprising \$36.6 million over four years in recurrent funding, and \$14.3 million in capital funding) for skills. In particular, ACT Labor allocated:

- \$2.5 million for additional places at CIT and an extra \$1 million for the CIT Vocational College;
- \$1.2 million to strengthen the Skilled and Business Migration Program, link final-year and graduating international students with potential employers and increase traineeships and apprenticeships in the ACT Public Service;
- \$4.2 million to strengthen the health workforce and a boost for the Live in Canberra campaign;
- Resources for a feasibility study into a new trades training centre in Fyshwick; and
- \$2.5 million to build capacity and leadership in the ACT public service.

Moving Forward

Encouraging post-school training in areas of identified skills shortage

ACT Labor is committed to helping support small business to attract betterqualified workers. It will aim to do this through a mix of measures that support employees while they improve their skills and training, and through policies that make Canberra a more attractive city for employees to move to and remain in.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

- Invest \$1 million to provide assistance with CIT fees and course materials to CIT students in areas of skills shortage; and
- Invest \$1 million in a scheme to pay HECS fees for graduates in areas of skills shortages as long as they remain employed in Canberra. This program will begin with graduates in areas of identified skills shortages, but will be reviewed during the term of the next ACT Labor Government for possible extension to other graduates.

Strengthening the Canberra Institute of Technology

ACT Labor believes a strong TAFE system is critical to not only responding to the critical issue of skills shortages, but to also ensuring Canberrans have the opportunity to reach their full potential.

Since being elected in 2001, we have increased real funding to the CIT by a massive 15.5% - a stark contrast to the previous Liberal government which cut funding by 25%

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

- Continue to recognise CIT as a world-class education provider and provide support and funding;
- Invest an extra \$5 million over the next four years for technology upgrades at the CIT including:
 - o new media and multimedia equipment;
 - o equipment for environmental science programs;
 - Dental instruments and materials to establish a simulated dental laboratory
 - o Hydraulic client hairdressing stools
 - Upgrade of ovens and deep fryers
 - o Restructure and upgrade of specialist computer laboratories
 - o Replacement of servers at the Reid campus;
- Continue to invest \$600,000 per year for the next three years in delivering extra teaching hours at the CIT, as outlined in the 2008-09 Budget:
- Continue to invest over \$250,000 per year for the next three years in supporting students at the Vocational College; and
- Provide additional support for students with a disability at the CIT.

ACT Labor believes that a flexible and innovative approach to vocational education and training is needed if we are to build the skills base of our community.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

- Continue to support Australian School Based apprenticeships, with the goal of 500 apprenticeships per year;
- Provide \$1.4 million to support 100 new Australian School Based Apprentices each year in our schools;
- Invest \$225,000 over four years to give 15 young Canberrans each year the opportunity to complete an Australian School Based Apprenticeship in the sport and recreation industry;
- Provide \$40,000 over the next term for Young Achievers Australia to develop business skills in ACT high schools, college and university students:
- Continue to invest over \$1 million per year for the next three years in increase funding for apprentices as outlined in the 2008-09 Budget; and
- Conclude consultations on raising the school leaving age, as outlined in our consultation paper *Pathways to the Future*.

Better access to training

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

 Further develop links to searchable websites for small businesses and education and training providers to allow small businesses to identify the most relevant sources of information and training advice for small business.

Attracting migrant workers

In line with recommendations from the Skills Commission, ACT Labor recognises that we need to increase our population of skilled workers. Currently we are disadvantaged under the Commonwealth Government's migration points scheme that does not recognise Canberra as a regional centre.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will:

 Pursue the Commonwealth to remove the disadvantage the ACT experiences through the current migration points system.

Community Places

Where we live matters and ACT Labor is building a better city and a stronger community by investing in our public amenities. Our community spaces help make Canberra a great place to live and enhance our lifestyles.

We have created places for Canberrans to meet, socialise, play and shop and are committed to ensuring that our community has high-quality public facilities and a range of outdoor spaces where they can spend their recreational time.

ACT Labor is committed to making sure our local shopping centres are of a good standard and provide a central meeting place in neighbourhoods. We have already upgraded the shops at Holt, Melba, Ainslie and Garran and have a forward program to bring other local shops up to modern standards.

We have also invested in improving the look and feel of the city, through upgrades in our main shopping precinct in Canberra City and surrounding streets.

Our community parks have also received a facelift, with investment in the upgrade of the Lake Ginninderra foreshore and Glebe Park and a significant upgrade and replanting program for local parks. ACT Labor has also equipped our parks and open spaces with BBQ and picnic equipment, so Canberrans can enjoy a range of outdoor activities.

We know that Canberrans value the high quality play spaces available for children. ACT Labor has improved 68 playgrounds, including those at Turner, Isaacs, Ainslie, Spence, Latham, Evatt, Flynn, Kambah, Fadden, Florey, Weetangera, Bruce and Chifley. And ACT Labor installed the ACT's first liberty swing, for children with a disability, at Black Mountain Peninsula.

Through our strong economic management, ACT Labor has been able to deliver this – and much more – to improve our community spaces and public amenities. ACT Labor will continue these programs to ensure that Canberrans can enjoy the best lifestyle in one of Australia's most liveable cities.

A Proud Record of Building Community Places

Canberra is a truly sustainable and creative city and national capital. We have a community that is socially inclusive and which acknowledges and supports those who are vulnerable and in need and enabling all to reach their full potential.

Canberra is also a centre of economic growth and innovation and is proudly the nation's capital city and home of its pre-eminent cultural institutions.

And Canberra is a place of great natural beauty with a proud history of balance between development and sustainability.

Our pristine natural environment is one of the things that make Canberra such a great place to live. Canberrans value the open spaces and outdoor facilities that are in our community.

ACT Labor has a great track record in adding to the amenity of Canberra's open spaces through the addition of 1500 extra hectares of nature parks, as well as maintaining and upgrading local neighbourhood parks and playgrounds.

Over the last term, the ACT Labor Government has implemented a series of master plans for Canberra's town and district parks, the most notable being the upgrade of Glebe Park, at a cost of \$1.37 million, with park furniture improvements, pathway improvements, new stage facility, new play facilities and shade and a tree planting program.

Our Record

ACT Labor has:

- Upgraded 68 playspaces including those in Turner, Isaacs, Ainslie, Spence, Latham, Evatt, Flynn, Kambah, Fadden, Florey, Weetangera, Bruce and Chifley;
- Upgraded the Holt, Melba, Garran and Ainslie Shopping Centres and started consultation on the refurbishment of the Deakin Shopping Centre;
- Held popular 'round town' events in our local parks;
- Replaced drought affected plantings with more drought tolerant species;
- To the end of 2006 had planted 4,465,905 trees in non-urban areas and planted 30,160 trees in urban areas;
- Completed stage two of the Belconnen lakeshore refurbishment;
- Installed the ACT's first liberty swing for disabled children at Black Mountain Peninsula;
- Restored and improved the Sanctuary @ Tidbinbilla; and
- Updated the Get out There Guide brochure.

In the latest Budget for 2008/09, ACT Labor mapped out a four year program of expenditure of \$2.2 million to upgrade local and district parks across the Territory, including:

- \$50,000 to design and construct a jetty and associated equipment for use by Sailability ACT as well as the general community at Lake Tuggeranong;
- New BBQs and picnic facilities to be installed at various district parks, including Yerrabi Pond Park, Glebe Park, Lennox Gardens, Eddison Park, Fadden Pines and Point Hut Pond Park with landscape improvements to John Knight Park BBQ areas;
- \$1.6 million towards renewal of 16 playspaces in local and district parks in Belconnen, Inner North, Oaks Estate, Woden and Tuggeranong;
- The installation of two new Liberty Wheelchair Swings –in North Canberra and Tuggeranong;
- New fitness trails to be installed at Eddison Park and John Knight Park, as well as a new flying fox for John Knight Park;
- \$390,000 to improve the Belconnen Skate Park;
- Two new dog exercise enclosures, one in Belconnen and the other in Tuggeranong. These enclosures will be fully fenced with gate access, water, signage, seating and short exercise courses for owners to train their dogs:

Rising interest rates have driven average mortgage repayments for Canberra families up by \$250 a month. Changes in the lending market have seen the rise of low-doc lenders. In the ACT, repossessions have risen by over 50 per cent, from 55 in 2004 to 83 in 2006¹. Losing a family home is devastating.

ACT Labor will establish a Mortgage Relief Fund to help households at risk of losing their homes. The program will focus on early support and assistance to households who are experiencing difficulties and at risk of default with their home loan repayments, as a result of an unforeseen change in their circumstances. ACT LABOR'S 2008 HOUSING STRATEGY TOWARDS MORE HOUSING OPTIONS FOR CANBERRANS

ACT Labor is committed to ensuring that all Canberrans have access to safe, secure and affordable housing.

Secure, appropriate and affordable housing is a basic right to which all Canberrans are entitled.

Labor believes that meeting the housing needs of a diverse community means ensuring there is a range of housing options, and that supply meets demand.

Labor is committed to ensuring Canberrans can live where they choose, in houses they can afford, and to have fewer people suffering homelessness.

Our strategy is to make affordable housing available to more people and to provide quality housing for those in greatest need in our community. And we are working to ensure that people have pathways to move across housing tenures so that our housing system provides the right response and the right time for our citizens.

While the relative wealth of the Canberra community means that we spend, on average, a smaller proportion of our income on housing than other Australians, there are some among us who experience housing stress. For some, the stress is financial. For others, it is caused by overcrowding, or lack of support, or changing physical requirements.

As our community changes demographically, and as the average number of people per household shrinks, our housing requirements are changing too.

The challenge has been, and continues to be, to anticipate and prepare, so that we are ready for the future.

Labor has a vision for Canberra for the next four years

Labor's vision is for a city where everyone is housed appropriately and affordably and where the needs of an ageing community are catered for and anticipated.

Labor's vision is to reduce the number of people experiencing homelessness and to provide pathways into long-term, secure housing for those in greatest need.

Labor's vision is for a robust social housing system that provides high quality accommodation and support options for its tenants.

Labor's vision is for a city where the aspiration of home ownership can be satisfied, but which caters too for renters, for those in community housing, for those in public housing, for Canberrans with disabilities, and for the ageing.

Our achievements

In its first term, Labor delivered targeted, means-tested stamp duty concessions for first-home buyers, expanded the land release program, replaced 81 public housing properties and invested more than \$13 million in homelessness initiatives.

In April 2007, in response to a decline in affordability in most capital cities, including Canberra, Labor launched a comprehensive Affordable Housing Action Plan, featuring more than 60 separate initiatives to tackle affordability at its roots. Initiatives implemented to date include:

the release of a record 3,400 housing blocks in 2007-08 and a new rolling five-year land release program;

streamlined land release and approval processes, and the introduction of englobo land

a requirement that 15% of new developments be devoted to house and land packages priced between \$200,000 and \$300,000;

targeted stamp duty concessions for low-income earners and stamp duty exemptions for

pensioners moving to more appropriate accommodation;

a 20% increase in the stamp duty income ceiling – households with incomes upto \$120,000 are now eligible for the Home Buyer Concession Scheme;

Deferral of stamp duty for up to 5 years;

- land rent, to enable families on incomes as modest as \$50,000 to purchase their own
- an invitation to institutional investors to build affordable private rental accommodation;
- a boost to community housing, with an equity injection of \$40 million and a revolving loan facility of \$50 million;

more targeted use of public housing - 87 per cent of new allocations are made to applicants in urgent need, compared with just 38 per cent nationally;

improving the energy efficiency of public housing to reduce bills for tenants;

a pilot program to help young tenants build supportive community networks;

two demonstration villages to showcase affordable land and housing packages; and

a design award for excellence in affordable housing.

Labor is now working on Phase II of our Affordable Housing Action Plan, focusing on affordable accommodation for older Canberrans - particularly those of modest means - and the homeless.

In addition to this Labor has:

Increased indexation to community sector funding annually, which has risen to 4%, to maintain the viability of the sector to ensure that high-quality services continue to be provided to the Canberra community:

Provided \$4.4 million for the ACT's most disadvantaged through the Community Inclusion

Invested \$2 million over 4 years to Anglicare's Junction Youth Health services in Tuggeranong and Gungahlin to employ two Youth Health Nurses and two Youth Health Workers to improve the health and well-being of young people in these areas;

Invested \$1.9 million recurrent to provide new 24-hour step-up, step-down innovative model of mental health facilities for both adults and youth. The youth facility was the first

of its kind in the country;

Provided \$3.9 million to fund 14 youth homelessness services. This investment has include the innovative Couch Surfing, Transitional Support for Young People Exiting Detention and the Outreach Support Young People Transition to Independence projects to support young homeless people;

Invested \$9 million per year into the services and support for the homeless, in addition to

the Commonwealths \$6 million annual investment;

- Increased supported accommodation places for families by over 30 per cent to to 124 in 2007-08;
- Invested close to \$1 million in an Early Morning Drop in Centre at Pilgrim Place since
- Negotiated and agreed a Social Compact with the sector;

Introduced a Charter of Rights for the homeless:

Increased funding to homelessness by 74% since 2001;

Successfully implemented Breaking the Cycle - the ACT Homelessness Strategy;

Improved housing services and implementing reforms aimed at providing a more targeted and responsive system to the needs of Housing ACT tenants;

- introduced revised housing assistance legislation and a new Public Rental Housing Assistance Program which more effectively provides housing to those most in need in the community:
- Significantly cut waiting times by 66 per cent, for those most in need waiting for public housing;
- Increased public housing property numbers from 11,454 to 11,551;
- Housing applicants in need of priority housing (as at 2 September 2008) within 52 days compared to in excess of 9 months under the previous allocation system;
- Effectively developed links with community organisations, in particular with the homelessness sector in building on a service continuum that supports people as they transition from homelessness into sustainable public housing tenancies;
- Implemented Breaking the Cycle the ACT Homelessness Strategy the Government's key policy commitment to improving responses to homelessness;
- implemented a Transitional Housing Program which ensures that clients exiting crisis accommodation can continue to receive critical support services while waiting for longer term housing options;
- more effectively utilised housing stock by encouraging residents to move to properties which better meet their needs; and
- Introduced a regulatory framework for non-profit housing providers to help protect the rights of tenants living in properties managed by not-for-profit providers.

What Labor delivered in its most recent Budget 2008-09 to help more Canberrans into homes

In the 2008-09 Budget the ACT Labor Government has:

- Boosted community housing with an equity injection of \$40 million and a revolving2loan facility of \$50 million;
- Provided greater support for children in public housing by undertaking a needs assessment to ensure that public housing appropriately takes account of the needs of children in the allocation of properties;
- Improved the energy efficiency of public housing and accelerated work to improve water efficiency of public housing by providing \$20m over 10 years;
- Provided an additional 52 dwelling units for public housing and a further 26 will be provided by the final funding instalment of \$10m in 2008-09;
- Approved a budget for capital expenditure on public housing in 2008-2009 of \$82.6 million; and
- Provided additional homelessness services for women over 55 with an additional \$40,000 invested.

Moving Forward

Increasing the supply of affordable housing in our city

Require 20 per cent of all new estates to be made up of affordable housing, under \$300,000

ACT Labor will increase the supply of affordable housing by requiring at least 20 per cent of all new estates to be made up of affordable house and land packages under \$300,000.

The ACT Labor Government mandated that at least 15 per cent of all new estates be made up of affordable house and land packages, through its nation-leading *Affordable Housing Action Plan*. These affordable blocks have consistently been in high demand and been the first to sell. By increasing this requirement to 20 per cent, there will be more affordable house and land packages for homebuyers.

This is not inclusionary zoning as it requires the provision of appropriately prices homes of varying sizes in a development. The affordable homes would be made up of different

products, including smaller blocks and smaller floorplans. These homes would not be affordable due to any subsidy.

Extend the affordable housing requirement to all types of homes, including townhouses and apartments

Labor appreciates that many Canberrans want to live closer to town centres in denser developments. ACT Labor will extend the 20% affordable housing mandate to other kinds of developments, including attached houses, apartments and townhouses.

Incentives to convert surplus C-grade office blocks to affordable housing
Canberra enjoys a low level of office vacancy. However, there is a growing demand for Agrade and B-grade space, leaving pockets of C-grade office accommodation vacant at times.
Such surplus offices are often located in town centres, in areas of high demand, and could be
transformed into affordable accommodation.

ACT Labor will provide incentives for owners of surplus C-grade office blocks to transform their properties into affordable housing, slashing change-of-use charges for owners who build affordable apartments in town centres and the City. Labor will reduce change-of-use charges associated with lease variations by 75 per cent for all owners of C-grade office space who agree to build affordable apartments for under \$300,000.

This will lead to greater population density around town centres which, in turn, will help our town centre thrive and provide greater opportunities for sustainable transport options such as better public transport hubs.

Increase the supply of affordable rental accommodation through the institutional investor program

ACT Labor will continue to work with institutional investors and the housing industry to deliver an extra 400 rental properties. As part of the *Affordable Housing Action Plan*, the ACT Labor Government has sought expressions of interest from institutional investors to form a partnership with government to deliver more affordable rental accommodation in Canberra.

Expressions of interest for this initiative have been short-listed and those short-listed have been asked to expand their proposals to provide up to 400 affordable rental properties in the ACT. A re-elected ACT Labor Government will see this initiative to fruition with institutional investors selected to provide more affordable rental properties around Canberra.

Maintain a supply of release-ready land

ACT Labor will maintain an adequate supply of release-ready land. This will ensure that any sudden movements in demand for housing can be catered for through the immediate release of land which is ready to be built on.

Due to the surge in the housing market over the past few years, the supply of release-ready, ready to be built on, land has diminished. Labor will ensure that all planned future land releases have the trunk infrastructure ahead of their predicted release dates. This will mean that all new greenfields land bought will be ready to be built on immediately after settlement.

Helping more Canberrans into housing and helping them keep their homes

Establish a Mortgage Relief Fund to help Canberrans at risk of losing their homes

Rising interest rates have driven average mortgage repayments for Canberra families up by \$250 a month. Changes in the lending market have seen the rise of low-doc lenders. In the ACT, repossessions have risen by over 50 per cent, from 55 in 2004 to 83 in 2006¹.

ACT Labor will establish a Mortgage Relief Fund to provide loans of upto \$10,000 for Canberrans at risk of defaulting on their mortgage and losing their family home. The Fund, made up of \$1.2 million over four years, will be used to provide early support and assistance to households who are experiencing difficulties and at risk of default with their home loan repayments as a result of an unforeseen change in their personal circumstances.

A re-elected Labor Government will also provide \$50,000 a year to a community organisation to manage the Mortgage Relief Fund and provide financial counselling to households who are at risk of losing their homes. Through the Mortgage Relief Fund, the community organisation will counsel each household on a case-by-case basis and provide tailored interest-free loans of up to \$10,000 to eligible households. The terms of the loan and repayments will be tailored to suit each household, as each household has its own personal circumstances which need to be managed on a case-by-case basis to ensure that each loan can be repaid.

The community organisation will also be able to better monitor repossessions and lending practices through this boost in funding. By obtaining detailed data, better knowledge can be obtained – and passed on to the community – about the types of loans that get households into financial strife.

ACT Labor will continue to work with the Council of Australian Governments (COAG) to create uniform consumer credit regulations. National reform will eliminate loopholes and allow better regulation of the credit sector, diminishing the potential for unscrupulous lenders to take advantage of buyers.

Implement shared equity schemes to assist low-to-moderate income households become homeowners

ACT Labor is committed to implementing shared equity schemes so that public housing and community housing tenants can realise the dream of home ownership. Shared equity schemes allow households on low incomes to purchase a proportion of their homes, with the housing provider or financier providing the remaining proportion. The program will assist public housing tenants to progressively purchase their property. The program will be carefully monitored to ensure families participating avoid financial stress.

ACT Labor will continue to work with CHC Affordable Housing to establish a shared equity scheme for community housing tenants. In February 2008, the ACT Labor Government exchanged contracts with CHC Affordable Housing, the ACT's community housing provider, for a \$50 million revolving finance facility to allow CHC to provide 1,000 affordable homes for sale and rent. CHC, in consultation with Housing ACT, is investigating the provision of a shared equity scheme for community housing tenants.

ACT Labor will also continue to work with the Council of Australian Governments and the Australian Housing Ministers' Council to find a nationally collaborative approach to shared equity.

Implement a homeshare program

ACT Labor will commit \$50,000 a year to provide a homeshare program to provide accommodation for low-income singles or students, while supporting older Canberrans to remain in their homes. Due to changes in personal circumstances, many older Canberrans live alone in their family home, where their children were raised. This program will help many empty-nesters remain in their homes, as they share their home with a boarder or lodger.

\$600,000 to establish the HOME Service

One of the most common challenges in attracting prospective migrants to Canberra is accommodation. ACT Labor will commit \$600,000 to create the HOME (Housing Options and Moving Enquiries) Service. This new service will be a one-stop shop for all enquiries related to housing in the ACT.

The HOME Service will provide advice to Canberrans and people looking to move to Canberra about where they can get access to housing whether they're looking to buy or rent. It will also point people in the direction of relevant concessions and options they have when buying their own home, such as land rent. The service will provide information about upcoming land releases and when englobo housing developments are due for sale direct to homebuyers.

The HOME Service will operate within the *Live in Canberra* unit to provide housing information to intending and existing residents.

Continue to fully implement the Affordable Housing Action Plan and embark on Phase two with a focus on aged accommodation and homelessness

ACT Labor will fully implement all of the first phase of its Affordable Housing Action Plan. Labor will continue its accelerated land release program aimed at stablising the cost of land and housing in the ACT. We will continue to monitor the land supply pipeline to ensure that there are appropriate responses to land supply in the future. Labor will continue to work with CHC Affordable Housing to ensure it delivers up to 1,000 affordable dwellings by 2017. Labor will continue to develop innovative examples of sustainable and accessible housing to encourage more options for sustainable living in our neighbourhoods. We will continue to fund the affordable housing design awards to inspire and encourage innovative affordable housing design.

Building on our nation-leading Affordable Housing Action Plan, a re-elected Labor Government will embark on Phase II, focusing on affordable accommodation options for older Canberrans, particularly those on modest incomes, along with the homeless.

Labor will explore, report on and implement, in collaboration with industry and the community, innovative options for providing affordable and appropriate accommodation for an ageing population, including 'virtual villages', group houses, and other options for ageing in the community.

Labor will continue to work with the Commonwealth

ACT Labor will continue to work through COAG, to implement the Commonwealth Rent Assistance Scheme, currently being reviewed by the COAG Housing Working Group. Labor will work together with other jurisdictions to review tax regimes through a new National Affordable Housing Agreement and will continue to work to address homelessness and supported accommodation through the Coalition of Australian Governments.

Helping more Canberrans find a place to call home

\$720,000 for expansions to Transitional Housing

ACT Labor will provide \$720,000 over for years to expand the Transitional Housing Program for Canberrans experiencing or at risk of homelessness and also to support refugees. The Transitional Housing Program has been a success story for those Canberrans experiencing or at risk of homelessness providing transitional accommodation for those moving out of crisis to long-term, settled living. Transitional houses, provided by ACT Housing, are matched with resourcing for outreach services provided by local Canberra NGO's.

ACT Labor will provide an additional \$80,000 per year for an expansion to the existing program and will seek to address a gap in housing for families, particularly women with children escaping domestic violence.

A re-elected Labor Government will also provide \$400,000 to expand the Refugee Transitional Housing Program, a partnership between Companion House, Centacare and Housing ACT. ACT Labor will double the number of homes available for the program from 8 to 16 and will include additional outreach support and material assistance for clients in transitioning to longer-term housing arrangements.

Community Outreach for rough sleepers, particularly young people

ACT Labor will commit \$800,000 over 4 years to fund community outreach workers, equipped with transport, to travel around the city to known 'hang-outs' of rough sleepers. These community workers will concentrate particularly on places where young people frequent, such as shopping centres, libraries and nature reserves.

Introduce a program to voluntarily transfer public housing tenants to housing that better matches their needs

ACT Labor will introduce a program to voluntarily transfer public housing tenants to housing that better matches their needs and the needs of future tenants on waiting lists. It is estimated that around 1,000 public housing tenants are now living in homes with surplus, unoccupied rooms following changes in their personal circumstances. For instance, when children grow up and leave home, or when a relationship breaks down and a former partner moves into a new home with their children rooms that were once full may become unoccupied.

Transferring to another property that better suits ones needs has benefits for the public housing tenant, as well as freeing up the larger property for another family who needs the additional rooms. By moving into a more suitable home, living expenses may be decline and the home will be easier to look after.

Following extensive community consultation, guidelines for this voluntary program have been developed which include consideration of individual circumstances, tenant preferences and possible assistance with removal expenses. A re-elected Labor Government will fully implement this program.

Continue to house tenants into public housing as soon as possible

ACT Labor will continue to house Canberrans most in need who apply for public housing as soon as possible. New waiting list categories were introduced in June 2006 ensuring that those most in need were housed in less time. Applicants are now assessed according to need and whether their circumstances meet the criteria for Priority, High Needs or Standard housing. Canberrans who are Priority or High Needs include those families who are homeless, have mental health issues, serious medical issues or a disability, or may be frailaged. These applicants may also include people with a disability where the natural support systems are at risk of breaking down, women (with or without children) escaping domestic violence, indigenous people facing complex issues and families with children at risk.

The average waiting time for those most in need is now around 50 days as compared to over nine months under the previous system. A re-elected Labor Government will continue to house those who need public housing as soon as possible.

Continue to make public housing more sustainable

ACT Labor is committed to making our public housing more sustainable and energy efficient through a \$20 million investment over 10 years. Labor will continue to implement this rolling program to provide more sustainable housing facilities for our tenants. These improvements include improvements to wall and ceiling insulation and energy efficiency of hot water systems and heating appliances.

This builds on Labor's commitment of \$500,000 over the past two years to improve water efficiency in our public housing. These improvements provided dual flush toilets, water saving shower heads, flow retardation devices and boundary limiting values.

Through these energy modifications, ACT Labor will not only make our public housing more energy efficient, but we will also be helping to reduce the cost of living for those on lower incomes.

\$1 million for Building Housing Partnerships

ACT Labor will provide \$1 million over four years for the Building Housing Partnerships program to help break the cycle of homelessness and disadvantage in our community. The program will support young people, aged persons, vulnerable families, and Indigenous families residing in public and community housing, and transitioning from homelessness.

Labor understands that there are a range of factors which contribute to individuals and families experiencing housing difficulty, which is why the Building Housing Partnerships program is backed by strong community development, family support, employment and skills and education policies that will assist Canberrans address challenges they may experience in their lives.

The Building Housing Partnerships program will provide:

living skills programs for vulnerable families, including support to find training and employment:

assistance for elderly tenants with minor household tasks and to maintain social contact with the community, to facilitate ageing in place;

tailored housing support for tenants with diverse needs;

culturally appropriate support for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander families; and

an extension of the Youth Housing Program to assist young people in public housing to re-establish links with education and training and to find employment.

Protecting Canberrans in their homes

\$100,000 seed funding for Kids Under Cover

ACT Labor will provide \$100,000 to help Kids Under Cover establish a hub in Canberra. Kids Under Cover provide an early-intervention model to assist families in crisis stay together with temporary accommodation for young people and the provision of support services.

Through this seed funding, Kids Under Cover can help prevent our at-risk children and young people from becoming homeless by building demountable bungalows to help them remain in their homes and continuing to keep our at-risk families together.

Kids Under Cover are widely recognised for their successful model and won the 2008 Victoria Day Award for Community and Public Service.

Labor will increase awareness about rental bidding

Competition for rental properties in the ACT has been strong over recent years. This has led to an anecdotal increase in rental bidding - when an agent invites a prospective tenant to bid more than the advertised price, when an agent advertises a property with a price range, or when there is no rental price advertised. While rental bidding - rent auctions – are illegal under existing ACT law, Labor believes an information campaign will help inform Canberrans about the effects of rental bidding.

ACT Labor will commit \$50,000 a year towards a campaign to inform and educate real estate agents on rental bidding and the harmful effects it can have on renters. The campaign will

also target renters informing them of the impact that rental bidding can have on the rents that they pay.

Labor will look after our ageing

As our community ages, more Canberrans will make the choice to relocate to retirement villages or other residential aged care facilities. ACT Labor will explore avenues for legislating to protect the financial and other rights of Canberrans purchasing homes in retirement villages, including the rights of those who seek to leave such villages. These laws will build on work and community consultation already begun by Labor backbencher Mary Porter MLA.

Continue to work with all concerned to address disruptive behaviour in public housing ACT Labor believes that all Canberrans have the right to feel safe and secure in their homes. Labor will continue to protect the rights of all Canberrans in their homes, including public housing tenants.

Labor recognises that governments have a social responsibility to assist people and those around them to resolve issues through support services such as anger management and alcohol and drug counselling. A recent amendment to the *Residential Tenancies Act* provides additional options other than an application for eviction if support programs are unable to remedy the situation.

ACT Labor will continue to work with community support providers to provide support services to public housing tenants who are experiencing difficulties with their neighbours.

A strong economy is fundamental to maintaining our standard of living, our high levels of employment, our business confidence, our government services and the social cohesion of our community.

A strong economy also gives us the capacity to invest in services and facilities for the community.

The ACT Government is committed to its role in ensuring that a strong, dynamic and resilient Territory economy meets the needs of the Canberra community now and into the future, maintains economic growth and promotes the ACT as the heart of our economic region.

Recently, the ACT Labor Government set out its broad direction for economic and business development in its *Capital Development: Towards our Second Century* strategy document. This policy now sets out the specific measures a ACT Labor will pursue to grow the economy, to assist business and to grow employment in the Territory.

The strengths of the ACT economy are its skilled and motivated workforce, and its flexible and enterprising business sector. If re-elected, the Government will continue to enable and support sustainable economic activity—to create an environment that attracts and retains skilled workers and investment, and allows both employees and business owners to drive economic growth and development.

At present, we live in turbulent economic times, and ACT Labor does not believe the ACT can simply sit back and be buffeted by changing national and international economic conditions. The ACT Labor Government is strong and experienced and committed to supporting sustained economic and business development for the benefit of the Territory and our community.

A Proud Record of Encouraging and Supporting Business and Economic Development

ACT Labor has worked hard to encourage and support business and economic development in the Territory.

ACT Labor has taken the hard decisions needed to ensure it has the economic fundamentals right — a strong economy, continuing budget surpluses and restrained Government spending.

Within this context of a strong and growing economy, ACT Labor has launched carefully targeted business and industry programs aimed at encouraging local business, particularly small and medium enterprises, to grow and develop.

Our Record

Since coming to office, ACT Labor has:

- Worked to ensure the ACT economy has been one of the strongest performing in the country; in 2006-07 the 5% real increase in Gross State Product per capita was almost double the national rate of 3.2%
- Delivered consecutive surpluses in each year of government
- Maintained a budget cash position that is the envy of other states and territories
- Made unprecedented investments in the Territory's infrastructure, with annual capital works expenditure increasing from around \$100 million in 2001 to a record \$314 million in 2007-08
- Delivered more land for residential, commercial and industrial development. The 2008-09 Budget supports the release of around 3,300 dwelling sites a year, around an average of 110,000 square metres a year of commercial sites, and around 100,000 square metres a year of industrial sites.
- Over 3,400 residential building blocks were released in 2007-08, the highest number released in a single year since self-government. A further 4,200 blocks are scheduled to be released this year
- Maintained the highest level of services in the nation at around 22 per cent above the national average, while our taxation levels remain middle-of-the-pack

This has been against a background of virtually full employment and a labour force participation rate at close to a record high.

Labor has achieved these outcomes while increasing the efficiency of its own operations. The internal efficiencies the Government has demanded of its agencies since coming to office deliver about \$100 million a year in savings, year after year.

Other ACT Labor policies

ACT Labor understands the need for a strong economy and a supportive environment for business can not be addressed just through specific economic and business measures alone. Thus, since coming to office, ACT Labor has also released and is implementing a range of other policies that make Canberra a more attractive city both for business and for employees with the skills our businesses need, including:

- ACT Skills Future- to tackle skills shortages
- ACT Affordable Housing Action Plan to improve housing affordability
- Weathering the Change the ACT's climate change strategy
- ACT Water Strategy to guarantee sustainable water supplies for a growing city
- Strategies to improve the ACT's infrastructure, including beginning preparation of the ACT's first *Infrastructure Plan* and the 2008-09 Budget's billion dollar *Building the Future* infrastructure fund
- Budget and policy initiatives to further develop the ACT's health, education and transport systems

The social impacts of Labor's achievements in these areas are clear:

- Life expectancy has increased by half a year for males, and a year for females since Labor came to office and remains the highest in the country
- The proportion of Canberrans with a post-school qualification has increased by 5 percentage points and remains the highest in the country
- Household disposable income has increased by 47 per cent since Labor came to office and remains the highest in the country
- The proportion of Canberrans on low incomes has decreased by around 3.5 per cent, and is the lowest in Australia

The 2008-09 ACT Budget

In its 2008-09 Budget, the ACT Labor Government announced a billion-dollar *Building the Future* infrastructure package to increase the productive capacity of our economy and workforce through:

- The creation of a health system to serve the needs of the next decade and beyond
- Improvements to the transport system
- Investments in meeting the challenges of climate change
- Improvements to urban amenities
- Improved public service infrastructure
- Providing for the growth of the city and its economy

The 2008-09 Budget also provided significant support for small and medium businesses, innovation and skills. These measures, already being implemented, include:

Small business

- Support for business, private-sector development, innovation and research totalling \$16.5 million over four years
- A 20 per cent increase in the payroll tax threshold, from the current
 \$1.25 million to \$1.5 million, at a cost of around \$28.7 million over four years
- \$1 million in venture capital for the Canberra Business Development Fund, and

Innovation

- In response to the Innovation, Creativity and Leadership report:
 - ❖ A \$3.1 million early-stage innovation incubation program
 - \$ \$1.1 million for the new CSIRO Plant Phenomics Centre, and \$2.5 million for the Australian National University's new Climate Change Adaptation Centre of Excellence

Supporting skills development

- \$36.6 million over four years in recurrent funding, and \$14.3 million in capital funding for skills. In particular, Labor has allocated:
 - ❖ \$2.5 million for additional places at CIT and an extra \$1 million for the CIT Vocational College
 - \$ \$1.2 million to strengthen the Skilled and Business Migration Program, link final-year and graduating international students with potential employers and increase traineeships and apprenticeships in the ACT Public Service
 - \$4.2 million to strengthen the health workforce and a boost for the *Live in Canberra* campaign
 - Resources for a feasibility study into a new trades training centre in Fyshwick
 - \$ \$2.5 million to build capacity and leadership in the ACT public service

Moving Forward

Building on this strong record of achievement, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with ACT business and other stakeholder groups to further strengthen the Territory's economy, to assist business and to grow employment.

The ACT Labor Government's recent Capital Development: Towards our Second Century economic and business development strategy laid out the broad directions and outlined the approach the Government will pursue if re-elected. This policy sets out specific measures the Government will undertake if re-elected to implement the broad strategy set out in the Capital Development strategy.

Maintain a strong economic base

A strong economy supports a strong business sector. As a first priority, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will maintain its commitment to strong fiscal management to provide the macroeconomic foundation to support business and continue the ACT's sustained economic development. At present, the ACT economy is strong, and only Labor has the experience and the vision to employ that strength to ensure the Territory is ready for the future. Labor's firm economic management is even more important for the well-being of the ACT following the recent turmoil in financial markets.

To ensure this continuing economic strength, if re-elected, ACT Labor pledges to maintain a surplus in each year's budget over its coming term.

Stronger ACT / Commonwealth Government coordination

Stronger and more effective collaboration between the ACT and Commonwealth Governments is important in avoiding problems and making the best use of the skills and resources of each Government in advancing the ACT.

The ACT Government will seek to enhance this relationship by approaching the Australian Government to establish a new Ministerial level forum with the aim of increasing the level of collaboration between the two governments for the benefit of the national capital.

Continue to build the Territory's skills base

Skill shortages are a continuing challenge for Canberra's businesses. The Territory needs more workers, and it needs more workers skilled in specific areas. Building on its response to the recommendations of the *ACT Skills Commission* through ACT *Skills Future Strategy*, and the 2008-09 Budget, ACT Labor will undertake suite of additional measures to address current and expected skills issues.

Encourage post-school training in areas of identified skills shortage

ACT Labor will support small business by helping them attract better-qualified workers through a mix of measures that support employees while they improve their skills and training and through policies that make Canberra a more attractive city for employees to move to and remain in once they have come to Canberra.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will consult with CIT and other stakeholders to develop and implement a scheme under which the ACT Labor Government will provide assistance with course fees and materials to CIT students studying in areas of skills shortage, at a cost of \$1,000,000 in its next term.

ACT Labor will help business employers attract university graduates and retain them once they graduate by paying students' on-going Higher Education Contribution Scheme payments while they remain employed in Canberra, at a cost of \$1,000,000 in its next term. This program will begin with graduates in areas of identified skills shortages, and will be reviewed during the term of the next ACT Labor Government for possible extension to other graduates.

Better access to training

A key element of ACT Labor's approach to business development is to enlarge the opportunities for business owners and employees to identify and easily access appropriate training.

Accordingly, a re-elected Labor Government will work with small businesses to identify and implement more effective means to deliver relevant information about appropriate training courses and providers to match the requirements of individual small businesses.

Building business and entrepreneurial skills in young adults

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will provide additional support over its next term for *Young Achievers Australia* to develop business skills in ACT high school, college and university students.

Young Achievers Australia is an innovative and effective leadership and business skills development program for the Territory's budding entrepreneurs. At present the program receives some in-kind and other ACT Labor Government assistance, and

under this proposal the current support will be augmented by an additional \$10,000 a year from 2008-09 in direct funding.

Continue to lobby the Commonwealth Government to address issues with the current business migration system

The current Commonwealth Government business migration system disadvantages the ACT in terms of attracting and retaining skilled workers important to Canberra businesses and the economy. ACT Labor will continue to lobby the Commonwealth to remove this disadvantage, and to assist the ACT attract skilled workers from other countries to meet ACT business needs.

Support small business

Keeping businesses ahead of technology change

ACT Labor will support home-based businesses and encourage home-based business start-ups by consulting with industry on measures to encourage all new land developments to provide *Fibre to Home* broadband connections.

ACT Labor will also work with the property and development industry to encourage the adoption of *common user* trenches for communications cabling, for all new residential, commercial and industrial developments.

Continue support for Canberra BusinessPoint

ACT Labor will continue to fund the *Canberra BusinessPoint* program, which has demonstrated its value in the provision of advice and mentoring services to ACT small business.

Business in Focus to continue

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will assist the business community to stage a biennial *Business in Focus Month*, commencing in September 2009 with the purposes of profiling Canberra as a place to do business and to assist businesses to develop new capabilities through education and information.

New payroll tax concession arrangements

Payroll tax is an important lever for the Government to use in attracting and retaining sustainable businesses that will grow the Territory economy and employ additional ACT workers.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will introduce a strategically focused payroll-tax concession program to support significant new private sector investment projects. A particular focus of the new approach will be on supporting innovation, growing ACT exports and further developing the skills capacity of ACT firms.

Building strategic relationships between business, Government and universities

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with ACT tertiary institutions and major public and private organisations to put in place supportive urban planning strategies that build, support and strengthen the innovation capability in the Acton-Bruce Innovation Corridor

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with tertiary education institutions and senior colleges to develop an integrated tertiary education system that meets current and emerging professional education and skill needs and opportunities

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will fund a feasibility study for a *Centre for Creative Enterprise and Cultural Production*, based on the capabilities at the Australian National University, University of Canberra and Canberra Institute of Technology, at a cost of \$100,000.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with education institutions, other education service providers and business, to grow and sustain the market for the export of education services. To assist this process, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will provide \$50,000 towards the cost of a business marketing strategy for the sector.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with the University of Canberra to position the University and its campus as a national and ACT-community indoor sports hub.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with the *Lighthouse Business Innovation Centre* located at the University of Canberra to trial a *Knowledge Connect* intermediary access program, to assist businesses develop strategic relationships with university and institution-based research staff.

Using Government purchasing to support local business

Reform of ACT Government procurement

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will review its procurement policies to further assist ACT businesses raise their awareness of Government procurement procurement procurement exercises, including through enhancing the ACT Government procurement website.

Small Business 30 day payment

As an extension of its business-friendly policies, under a re-elected ACT Labor Government all undisputed payments owed by the ACT Government to business and service suppliers to the Government will be paid within 30 days of receipt of an invoice. Government agencies that do not make payments on agreed invoices within 30 days will pay an additional, commercial rate of interest on late payments.

Assisting business prepare for climate change

Climate change is one of the most pressing challenges the ACT will face in the coming years. ACT Labor will assist business in a number of ways to prepare for climate change.

Small business climate change information service

It is also important that small businesses become aware of the possible impacts of climate change on their operations. ACT Labor will assist in this task by providing \$148,000 in its next term to fund a service providing best practice information and advice on climate change mitigation and adaptation measures.

Helping business to be wise with water

A particular issue is making better use of water, one of our most scarce resources. To assist small businesses with this challenge, the ACT Labor Government will provide \$600,000 over its next term to support business water audits and the development of business water management plans, to undertake business continuity planning and to support businesses implement water saving measures.

Building audits

The ACT has a large amount of ageing second and third class commercial property, that may not be being managed as effectively as possible in terms of its energy efficiency. To respond to this issue, ACT Labor, if re-elected, will provide funding of \$75,000 in its next term to fund building efficiency audits of second and third class commercial property.

Supporting exporters

ACT Labor will provide particular support for Territory businesses that export goods and services, or those that are striving to position themselves for export activity. In signing a Memorandum of Understanding with Austrade recently, the ACT Labor Government signalled its commitment to working with Austrade as well as local firms already exporting to seeking to export.

ACT Labor will further assist exporters by expanding the existing *Trade Connect Program* with an additional \$150,000 for a total of \$400,000 per year over the next three years.

If re-elected, ACT Labor will continue its current level of funding to support for the *ACT Exporters Network*, and the *ACT Chief Minister's Export Awards*.

ACT Labor will undertake a census of ACT exporters and export intenders to gather strategic information on ACT export capacity and to inform policy and measure the impact of programs and services. This will be updated every two years.

ACT Labor is committed to strengthening the Territory's connections with strategically important export markets such as China. It will work with local universities to deliver a feasibility study to establish a Confucius Institute in the ACT, based on successful models operating elsewhere in Australia and overseas. Confucius Institutes are dedicated to the promotion and development of Chinese language, culture and business relationships and based on a partnering model with a Chinese university. ACT Labor will also increase its support for the ACT Honorary Ambassador Program to assist the Government's trade, migration and investment facilitation objectives. The combined cost of these two initiatives is \$309,000 over the next term.

Encouraging innovation

Innovation Canberra.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with peak business groups and other stakeholders to establish a new entity, to be known as *Innovation Canberra*. *Innovation Canberra* will be responsible for leading, driving and coordinating initiatives requiring the collaboration of industry, government, research organisations and the tertiary education sector in encouraging and promoting innovation in ACT business. If re-elected, the ACT Labor Government will provide funding of \$300,000 over the Government's next term for this new entity.

Continue support for Screen ACT

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will commit to a further funding agreement for *ScreenACT* to support Canberra's growing digital multimedia, film and documentary production sector, at a cost of \$555,000 in its next term.

· CollabIT

It is important for ACT small and medium sized businesses operating in the information and communication technology field that they be supported to develop links with larger national and international firms in this sector.

To assist this, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with the Australian Information Industries Association on the *CollabIT* program, at a cost of \$150,000 over the next term of government.

Supporting retailers through urban renewal

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will continue to work to improve the attractiveness of Canberra as a place to live and work, invest and do business.

Improving Civic as the centre of the city

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with Canberra CBD Ltd to develop an integrated plan for Civic, and to refresh the Sydney and Melbourne buildings.

ACT Labor will support enhanced *Grooving in the City* style outdoor community activities in Civic in partnership with Canberra CBD Ltd.

Implementing the Government's new supermarket competition policy

ACT Labor will continue the implementation of its supermarket competition policy by undertaking a review of the Dickson, and a revision of the Dickson and Kingston Master Plans, at a cost of \$220,000 in its next term if re-elected.

Upgrade and extend infrastructure

Good quality urban infrastructure provides a strong platform for ACT business, and the ACT Government is determined to ensure that the Territory's urban and other infrastructure is well planned, meeting priority needs and delivered on time. In pursuing these goals, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will undertake a number of measures, listed below.

Audit existing public assets

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will audit the ACT's public assets and infrastructure, including roads, bridges and other facilities to ascertain the state of our current capital assets.

Complete a ten-year infrastructure development plan

To strengthen its strategic approach to infrastructure planning for the Territory, a reelected ACT Labor Government will complete a rolling ten-year infrastructure plan for the Territory. This ACT Infrastructure Plan will be used to inform the planning and delivery of the ACT Labor Government's billion dollar Building the Future capital works program.

New structures and processes for better coordination of infrastructure delivery

It is important to continue to review and improve processes for the planning and delivery of government services and facilities. In this light, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will investigate possible new structures and processes to better coordinate planning and delivery of the Government's infrastructure program, in particular:

Better alignment of project planning and delivery with Government priorities;

- More certain commencement times for projects; and
- Expand the role of the ACT Government's *Strategic Project Facilitation*Group to take a more proactive role in identifying and addressing bottlenecks and assisting major private and public sector capital investment opportunities.

Canberra International Airport

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will support the development of Canberra International Airport through collaborations with Canberra International Airport in marketing and promotion initiatives.

Planning for a new National Convention Centre

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will proceed with a feasibility study into development of a new National Convention Centre for Canberra. An ACT Labor Government will also continue to seek Commonwealth financial and other participation in this important ACT and national project.

Taxis

The ACT Labor Government believes current issues within the Canberra taxi industry are a major concern for the community, the tourism industry and the taxi industry itself. The ACT Labor Government has already taken a number of initiatives, but more remains to be done.

In consultation with the industry and other stakeholders, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will work through a consultative forum to identify long-term solutions to the problems of the taxi industry, including:

- Making the taxi industry a higher priority for the Government's Live in Canberra skills attraction program to address the shortage of taxi drivers in the ACT;
- Reviewing the formula underpinning the taxi Composite Cost Index;
- A formula addressing the future release of taxi plates; and
- Other legislative impediments to the taxi industry.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will also assist the taxi industry by continuing to encourage more High Occupancy Taxis within the existing fleet.

Debate covered the a range of commitments already made.

JS's main point throughout the debate was that Liberals will cut the Health budget by \$250m (on the basis that only \$50m of the \$300m has been committed by Liberals). ZS in answer to the question on savings measures said that the Health spending will not be cut. He did not specify any savings, but said that a Liberal govt will have different priorities and mentioned two which are not their priorities - Busway and ESA HQ at Fairbairn (indirectly by saving that rents for empty buildings).

In response to a question on the priorities for the first 100 days, ZS said that the Liberals will concentrate on implementing policies to reduce class sizes in Y4 and increase the number of high school teachers (Education), establish bulk-billing GP clinics (Health) and green bins and insulating houses of low income people (Environment). JS was not specific, but said that Labor will continue with the broad policy agenda in each of the area.

Labor will be releasing the Planning and Housing policies in the next couple of days.

You have ask why I have not taken account of the report in today's Canberra Times that the Leader of the Opposition will match precisely the Labor Party's proposed expenditure of the growth funds in health.

In relation to my process, the costings summary which I provided you is based on the Liberal Party policy statements published on their website and their own press releases. I have sought clarification from them on a number issues, where I needed to in relation to my interpretation of these documents. While Treasury has monitored the actual media, in particular the Canberra Times, we do not take this as a definitive source of information as we have found it often difficult to reconcile this to either party's actual policy statements.

he particular issue of health, the Liberal Policy Statement says that "The 2008 ACT Budget included significant funding for health. As an alternative Government, the Canberra Liberals have acted responsibly and made it clear that we will continue with this rollout of new spending - in full".

I sought clarification from the Leader of the Opposition's Office on a number of occasions over the past two days (including yesterday morning, yesterday evening and again this morning) on this issue and the issue of the use of the growth funding.

From these conversations it is my opinion that they believed they had committed to maintaining the **expenditure levels** in the current budget, and that it is their intention to maintain their **new** expenditure commitments within the existing forward provisions in the Budget. It is also my understanding, from these conversations, that they **were not** committing to undertake the new policies announced by the Labor party as part of the election, but to instead substitute their own priorities within the health funding forward provision. These initiatives have been identified in the Treasury Summary and the presentation of these items was discussed and cleared with the Leader of the Opposition's Office.

I have obviously placed these conversations with the Leader of the Opposition's Office as a more authoritative source than the media reports.

I refer to your second question on the \$10 million commitment to upgrade Commonwealth Park. My understand of beral Policy Statement on the issue is that they have made the action contingent on the granting of a 100 year lease of the Park to the Territory. Should this occur, it is conceivable that the transaction may be structured in such a way as to account for the transaction as an investment and depreciated.

As a result of these statements, the Under Treasurer, Ms Smithies, has written to me stating the following:

"I understand the press is reporting today that the Leader of the Opposition has stated that in some way I, as part of the costings exercise, provided advice to him that there will be no job cuts from the Liberal Party savings measures. You have asked if I provided any such advice. I can confirm that I had no discussion with the Leader of the Opposition or his Office on the issue of job cuts."

"We now have clear evidence of the level of deception that the Liberals will go to in their desperate winat-all-costs bid to secure votes," Mr Stanhope said.

A Proud Record of Encouraging and Supporting Business and Economic Development

ACT Labor has worked hard to encourage and support business and economic development in the Territory.

ACT Labor has taken the hard decisions needed to ensure it has the economic fundamentals right – a strong economy, continuing budget surpluses and responsible Government spending.

Within this context of a strong and growing economy, ACT Labor has launched carefully targeted business and industry programs aimed at encouraging local business, particularly small and medium enterprises, to grow and develop.

Our Record

Since coming to office, ACT Labor has:

- Worked to ensure the ACT economy has been one of the strongest performing in the country; in 2006-07 the 5% real increase in Gross State Product per capita was almost double the national rate of 3.2%;
- Delivered consecutive surpluses in each year of government;
- Maintained a budget cash position that is the envy of other states and territories;
- Made unprecedented investments in the Territory's infrastructure, with annual capital works expenditure increasing from around \$100 million in 2001 to a record \$314 million in 2007-08;
- Delivered more land for residential, commercial and industrial development. The 2008-09 Budget supports the release of around 3,300 dwelling sites a year, around an average of 110,000 square metres a year of commercial sites, and around 100,000 square metres a year of industrial sites;
- Over 3,400 residential building blocks were released in 2007-08, the highest number released in a single year since self-government. A further 4,200 blocks are scheduled to be released this year;
- Maintained the highest level of services in the nation at around 22% above the national average, while our taxation levels remain middle-of-the-pack;
- A \$3.1 million early-stage innovation incubation program
- Allocated \$1.1 million for the new CSIRO Plant Phenomics Centre, and \$2.5 million for the Australian National University's new Climate Change Adaptation Centre of Excellence
- Allocated \$36.6 million over four years in recurrent funding and \$14.3 million in capital funding for skills. In particular, Labor has allocated:

This has been achieved against a background of virtually full employment and a labour force participation rate at close to a record high.

ACT Labor has delivered these outcomes while increasing the efficiency of its own operations. The internal efficiencies the Government has demanded of its agencies since coming to office deliver about \$100 million a year in savings, year after year.

ACT Labor understands the need for a strong economy and a supportive environment for business can not be addressed just through specific economic and business measures alone.

Continue to build the Territory's skills base

Skill shortages are a continuing challenge for Canberra's businesses. The Territory needs more workers, and it needs more workers skilled in specific areas. Building on its response to the recommendations of the ACT Skills Commission through ACT Skills Future Strategy, and the 2008-09 Budget, ACT Labor will undertake suite of additional measures to address current and expected skills issues.

Encourage post-school training in areas of identified skills shortage

ACT Labor will support small business by helping them attract better-qualified workers through a mix of measures that support employees while they improve their skills and training and through policies that make Canberra a more attractive city for employees to move to, and remain in once they have come to Canberra.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will consult with CIT and other stakeholders to develop and implement a scheme under which the ACT Labor Government will provide assistance with course fees and materials to CIT students studying in areas of skills shortage, at a cost of \$1 million in its next term.

ACT Labor will help business employers attract university graduates and retain them once they graduate by paying students' on-going Higher Education Contribution Scheme payments while they remain employed in Canberra, at a cost of \$1 million in its next term. This program will begin with graduates in areas of identified skills shortages, and will be reviewed during the term of the next ACT Labor Government for possible extension to other graduates.

Better access to training

A key element of ACT Labor's approach to business development is to enlarge the opportunities for business owners and employees to identify and easily access appropriate training.

Accordingly, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with small businesses to identify and implement more effective means to deliver relevant information about appropriate training courses and providers to match the requirements of individual small businesses.

Building business and entrepreneurial skills in young adults

The current Commonwealth Government business migration system disadvantages the ACT in terms of attracting and retaining skilled workers important to Canberra businesses and the economy. ACT Labor will continue to lobby the Commonwealth to remove this disadvantage and to assist the ACT attract skilled workers from other countries to meet ACT business needs.

Continue to encourage skilled workers to move to Canberra

ACT Labor will encourage more skilled workers to move to Canberra by continuing to fund our award-winning *Live in Canberra* Campaign and *Skilled and Business Migration Program*.

Support small business

Keeping businesses ahead of technology change

ACT Labor will support home-based businesses and encourage home-based business start-ups by consulting with industry on measures to encourage all new land developments to provide *Fibre to Home* broadband connections.

ACT Labor will also work with the property and development industry to encourage the adoption of *common user* trenches for communications cabling, for all new residential, commercial and industrial developments.

Continue support for Canberra BusinessPoint

ACT Labor will continue to fund the *Canberra BusinessPoint* program, which has demonstrated its value in the provision of advice and mentoring services to ACT small business.

Business in Focus to continue

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will assist the business community to stage a biennial *Business in Focus Month*, commencing in September 2009 with the purposes of profiling Canberra as a place to do business and to assist businesses to develop new capabilities through education and information.

New payroll tax concession arrangements

Payroll tax is an important lever for the Government to use in attracting and retaining sustainable businesses that will grow the Territory economy and employ additional ACT workers.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will introduce a strategically focused payroll-tax concession program to support significant new private sector investment projects. A particular focus of the new approach will be on supporting innovation, growing ACT exports and further developing the skills capacity of ACT firms.



Business and Economic Development

Building strategic relationships between business, government and universities

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with ACT tertiary institutions and major public and private organisations to put in place supportive urban planning strategies that build, support and strengthen the innovation capability in the Acton-Bruce Innovation Corridor.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with tertiary education institutions, and senior colleges, to develop an integrated tertiary education system that meets current and emerging professional education and skill needs and opportunities.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will fund a feasibility study for a *Centre for Creative Enterprise and Cultural Production*, based on the capabilities at the Australian National University, University of Canberra and Canberra Institute of Technology, at a cost of \$100,000.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with education institutions, other education service providers and business, to grow and sustain the market for the export of education services. To assist this process, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will provide \$50,000 towards the cost of a business marketing strategy for the sector.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with the University of Canberra to position the University and its campus as a national and ACT-community indoor sports hub.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with the *Lighthouse Business Innovation Centre* located at the University of Canberra to trial a *Knowledge Connect* intermediary access program, to assist businesses develop strategic relationships with university and institution-based research staff.

Using Government purchasing to support local business

Reform of ACT Government procurement

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will review its procurement policies to further assist ACT businesses raise their awareness of Government procurement procurement procurement exercises, including through enhancing the ACT Government procurement website.

Small Business 30 day payment

As an extension of its business-friendly policies, under a re-elected ACT Labor Government all undisputed payments owed by the ACT Government to business and service suppliers to the Government will be paid within 30 days of receipt of an invoice. Government agencies that do not make payments on agreed invoices within 30 days will pay an additional, commercial rate of interest on late payments.



Business and Economic Development

Assisting business prepare for climate change

Climate change is one of the most pressing challenges the ACT will face in the coming years. ACT Labor will assist business in a number of ways to prepare for climate change.

Small business climate change information service

It is also important that small businesses become aware of the possible impacts of climate change on their operations. ACT Labor will assist in this task by providing \$148,000 in its next term to fund a service providing best practice information and advice on climate change mitigation and adaptation measures.

Helping business to be wise with water

A particular issue is making better use of water, one of our most scarce resources. To assist small businesses with this challenge, the ACT Labor Government will provide \$600,000 over its next term to support business water audits and the development of business water management plans to undertake business continuity planning and to support businesses implement water saving measures.

Building audits

The ACT has a large amount of ageing second and third class commercial property that may not be being managed as effectively as possible in terms of its energy efficiency. To respond to this issue ACT Labor, if re-elected, will provide funding of \$75,000 in its next term to fund building efficiency audits of second and third class commercial property.

Supporting exporters

ACT Labor will provide particular support for Territory businesses that export goods and services, or those that are striving to position themselves for export activity. In signing a Memorandum of Understanding with Austrade recently, the ACT Labor Government signalled its commitment to working with Austrade to support local firms already exporting or seeking to export.

ACT Labor will further assist exporters by expanding the existing *Trade Connect Program* with an additional \$150,000 for a total of \$400,000 per year over the next three years.

If re-elected, ACT Labor will continue its current level of funding to support the ACT Exporters Network, and the ACT Chief Minister's Export Awards.

ACT Labor will undertake a census of ACT exporters and export intenders to gather strategic information on ACT export capacity, to inform policy and measure the impact of programs and services. This will be updated every two years.



Business and Economic Development

ACT Labor is committed to strengthening the Territory's connections with strategically important export markets such as China. It will work with local universities to deliver a feasibility study to establish a Confucius Institute in the ACT, based on successful models operating elsewhere in Australia and overseas. Confucius Institutes are dedicated to the promotion and development of Chinese language, culture and business relationships and based on a partnering model with a Chinese university. ACT Labor will also increase its support for the ACT Honorary Ambassador Program to assist the Government's trade, migration and investment facilitation objectives. The combined cost of these two initiatives is \$309,000 over the next term.

Encouraging innovation

Innovation Canberra

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with peak business groups and other stakeholders to establish a new entity, to be known as *Innovation Canberra*. *Innovation Canberra* will be responsible for leading, driving and coordinating initiatives requiring the collaboration of industry, government, research organisations and the tertiary education sector in encouraging and promoting innovation in ACT business. If reelected, the ACT Labor Government will provide funding of \$300,000 over the Government's next term for this new entity.

Continue support for Screen ACT

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will commit to a further funding agreement for *ScreenACT* to support Canberra's growing digital multimedia, film and documentary production sector, at a cost of \$555,000 in its next term.

CollabIT

It is important for ACT small and medium sized businesses operating in the information and communication technology field that they be supported to develop links with larger national and international firms in this sector.

To assist this, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with the Australian Information Industries Association on the *CollabIT* program, at a cost of \$150,000 over the next term of government.

Supporting retailers through urban renewal

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will continue to work to improve the attractiveness of Canberra as a place to live and work, invest and do business.



Business and Economic Development

Improving Civic as the centre of the city

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will work with Canberra CBD Ltd to develop an integrated plan for Civic, and to refresh the Sydney and Melbourne buildings.

ACT Labor will support enhanced *Grooving in the City* style outdoor community activities in Civic in partnership with Canberra CBD Ltd.

Implementing the Government's new supermarket competition policy

ACT Labor will continue the implementation of its supermarket competition policy by undertaking a review of the Dickson, and a revision of the Dickson and Kingston Master Plans, at a cost of \$220,000 in its next term if re-elected.

Upgrade and extend infrastructure

Good quality urban infrastructure provides a strong platform for ACT business, and the ACT Government is determined to ensure that the Territory's urban and other infrastructure is well planned, meets priority needs and is delivered on time. In pursuing these goals, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will undertake a number of measures, listed below.

Audit existing public assets

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will audit the ACT's public assets and infrastructure, including roads, bridges and other facilities to ascertain the state of our current capital assets.

Complete a ten-year infrastructure development plan

To strengthen its strategic approach to infrastructure planning for the Territory, a reelected ACT Labor Government will complete a rolling ten-year infrastructure plan for the Territory. This ACT Infrastructure Plan will be used to inform the planning and delivery of the ACT Labor Government's billion dollar Building the Future capital works program.

New structures and processes for better coordination of infrastructure delivery

It is important to continue to review and improve processes for the planning and delivery of government services and facilities. In this light, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will investigate possible new structures and processes to better coordinate planning and delivery of the Government's infrastructure program, in particular:

Canberra International Airport

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will support the development of Canberra International Airport through collaborations with Canberra International Airport in marketing and promotion initiatives.

Planning for a new National Convention Centre

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will proceed with a feasibility study into development of a new National Convention Centre for Canberra. An ACT Labor Government will also continue to seek Commonwealth financial and other participation in this important ACT and national project.

Taxis

The ACT Labor Government believes current issues within the Canberra taxi industry are a major concern for the community, the tourism industry and the taxi industry itself. The ACT Labor Government has already implemented a number of initiatives, but more remains to be done.

In consultation with the industry and other stakeholders, a re-elected ACT Labor Government will work through a consultative forum to identify long-term solutions to the problems of the taxi industry, including:

- Making the taxi industry a higher priority for the Government's *Live in Canberra* skills attraction program to address the shortage of taxi drivers in the ACT;
- Reviewing the formula underpinning the taxi Composite Cost Index;
- · A formula addressing the future release of taxi plates; and
- Other legislative impediments to the taxi industry.

A re-elected ACT Labor Government will also assist the taxi industry by continuing to encourage more High Occupancy Taxis within the existing fleet.
